Hiking opportunities offer many different levels of difficulty and a wide variety of locations. There are many museums and Interpretation Centres for those who enjoy history, culture and nature.

Highway 132 is the highway that circles the Peninsula and offers you an almost constant view of the Bay of Chaleur and the Gulf of St. Lawrence. But don't deny yourself the enjoyment of discovering more of the Gaspé, a little bit "off the beaten path". Take your time because the Gaspé is best enjoyed at a leisurely pace.

Many of the residents of the coastal towns and villages along the southern coast are English-speaking and many residents are bilingual. Many of the English-speakers are the descendants of Scottish, Irish and English immigrants. The Gaspé also is the home of people who are Mi'gmaq aboriginals. Acadians also settled here. The residents of the Gaspé are a blend of many influences and cultures and its rich and varied history is evident. Names of towns, churches, style of homes and even names of streets are a clear indication that we are a blend of a number of cultures.

The Gaspé has something for every visitor, young or old. There are opportunities to enjoy the water, whether the salt water of Chaleur Bay, the Gulf of St. Lawrence or the pristine lakes and rivers that abound here. If you are looking for a vacation for total relaxation or a more active holiday that is up to you! Opportunities to take memorable photos abound. Snap a selfie in every location you visit. The southern coast of the Gaspé begins around Matapedia if you are travelling eastward. As you drive, or cycle, eastward you will come to the communities of Restigouche, Listuguj, Pointe-à-la-Croix, Pointe-à-la-Garde, Escuminac, Miguasha, Nouvelle and Saint-Omer. Restigouche is the location of The Battle of Restigouche in 1759. Essentially it was a battle between the British navy and the French and their allies, which included Mi'gmaq and Acadian troops. The French, after this defeat ended their hopes of reclaiming Quebec.

Miguasha is the home of a UNESCO World Heritage Centre. This site is recognized because of the presence of fossils which provide excellent examples of the era known as the "Age of Fishes". Some of the very best fossil specimens, in high numbers, have been unearthed here. A visitor centre describes the importance of these fossils from 370 million years ago.

As you travel eastward, all the while having an excellent view of the Bay of Chaleur, be sure to note the variety of sea birds that abound on the Gaspé Peninsula. The Bay of Chaleur was given its name, meaning "bay of warmth" by Jacques Cartier in 1534. Though the water temperature is often cool, Cartier arrived in July that year when the waters were a little warmer.

Carleton, which includes the town of Saint-Omer since 2000, derives much of its economy from tourism. In fact, almost ¾ of the population is employed in tourism and the services which support it. With a population of about 4,000, Carleton has a great deal to offer tourists. Dining, thalassotherapy, unique stores and beautiful waterfront all add to the lovely vacation experience to be enjoyed in Carleton and area.

Hikers' Paradise

The Gaspé is a hiker's dream come true. Hiking can be done on relatively flat areas, along rivers or beaches or the hikes can involve more strenuous climbs such as Carleton Mountain. But the secret to a positive hiking experience is being prepared. On the Gaspé the weather can be changeable so dress and pack accordingly. Comfortable hiking boots are recommended for longer treks and a waterproof, wind resistant jacket is a plus. If you get warm just tie it around your waist and carry on! Dress in layers, that can be taken off or added as the weather changes. A hat, water and sunscreen are important components of a successful hike. And do not forget a camera or cell phone to take selfies and panoramic shots to keep those memories alive!





Gesgapegiag

As you travel eastward you will pass through Maria and then Gesgapegiag. Maria was historically the site of a summer settlement for Mi'gmaq families. Then in the 1770s, the area was settled by Scottish, Irish and Loyalists

Gesgapegiag is one of three First Nations communities found on the Peninsula. The land there was set aside in 1853 for the Mi'gmaq people. Visit the church there whose style resembles a traditional tepee dwelling. Various events are held at Gesgapegiag including musical evenings, bingo and traditional pow wows. Canoe rentals are available during the summer months. Have a look in the handicraft shops there for traditional native goods, such as baskets, dream catchers, carvings and jewellery.








Cascapedia-St-Jules



Paspebiac is a historically significant town which boasts the Banc de Paspébiac which is the home of a historic fishing centre established by people from the Channel Islands, the most prominent being Charles Robin. Paspébiac was Quebec's first cod fishing centre. You may notice that the accent of the French-speakers is distinctive in Paspébiac. The early Europeans came from Portugal and the Basque region and their language's influence can still be detected in the area today.

This site has been officially recognized as a "National Historic Site of Canada". Currently a very busy wharf and fishing plant is located here. Come during fishing season to see the boats come to unload their precious cargo. There is a store open to the public where you can purchase freshly caught crab, lobster, herring and more! A scenic boardwalk provides a lovely environment for walks, gazing at the water, watching the seabirds and smelling the fresh salt air.

The town also offers a motel, an auberge, a number of restaurants, pharmacies and shopping. The town hosts a number of festivals. The magnificent Catholic church has a Casavant organ and offers evenings of music there.





The Perfect Picnic

The Gaspé boasts the perfect environment for a picnic. Whether you choose to picnic on the beach, in a park or by a river is up to you. There are so many lovely spots for that perfect picnic. The Gaspé has so much to offer the traveler who enjoys sampling locally grown and produced foods. Locally produced honey, strawberry and honey wines, jams and pies, many bakeries, and specially blended coffee can all add to your eating pleasure. Local fish stores are the perfect place to buy low-cost "Gaspesian finger food". Pick up some sushi or, for a few dollars some smoked herring or dried fish to nibble on.

You are on the Gaspé and you will want to enjoy freshly cooked lobster from the waters of the Bay and Gulf. Prices are lower in the spring and summer during lobster fishing season. Imagine a warm summer evening, sitting outside enjoying a lobster. A chilled wine, garlic butter, baguette and fresh salad will help to create the perfect Gaspesian meal with friends and family.

Many people shy away from eating a whole lobster because it is an intimidating prospect. Fear not. Some essential tools, patience, a sense of humour and a relaxed Gaspesian attitude will make the experience enjoyable.

YOU NEED:

Whole lobsters (cooked)

Seafood scissors

A bowl for shells and discarded bits

Lots of serviettes / wet wipes Seafood (shell) crackers Metal seafood picks

Bibs

METHOD:

- Twist off the claws.
- Twist and pull the tail and remove it from the body.
- Pull off the legs and bits and suck the meat out of the legs.
- Separate the claws where they are jointed and use the scissors and cracker to get the meat. The seafood picks come in handy at every stage of eating your lobster.
- Cut the soft part of the tail with seafood scissors and pry open. The tail is often the best part of the lobster and with luck and some skill you might get all the tail meal out in one big piece.
- The lobster body and head contain a lot of meat. Pull off the top shell and you might see tomalley, (green stuff which is basically the liver). It is edible, if you wish to eat it. In the body shell there are thin papery bits that separate the meat and you can pick the meat out of there to eat.

There! You have enjoyed a true Gaspesian experience!





As you travel eastward you come to the Municipality of Hope which has a lovely family friendly park which offers mini-golf and tennis courts. A seaside hike will offer numerous opportunities for photographs at any point in the day or evening.

The Municipality of Hope Town, which is just east of Hope, has a large campground with beautiful views, a pool and a very busy canteen! This is the perfect place to stop with your family because the children will enjoy the popular playground found in Hope Town. Hope Town derives its name from Henry Hope, born in Scotland around 1750. He was a Lieutenant Governor of Quebec. The first European to settle there was Duncan McRae, a soldier from Scotland.

As you travel eastward you will pass through Saint-Godefroi, Shigawake and Port Daniel - Gascons. Each town is unique and all offer a variety of experiences for travelers.

Saint-Godefroi has a scenic harbour and you might be able to watch lobster and other fishing vessels come and go. A fresh fish store is situated here. Predominantly French-speaking it has a population of about 400. A campground is available there as well.

Shigawake is a small, vibrant community that takes its name from the Mi'gmaq word meaning "land of the rising sun" or "white water". The oldest farmhouse, from the early 1800s, on the Gaspé that was continuously inhabited by one family is located in Shigawake. The annual Shigawake Agricultural Fair, running for over 100 years, draws huge crowds for the agricultural activities and the eclectic Music Festival.

The city hall in Port Daniel has very interesting architecture and provides great photo opportunities, as does most of the Gaspé Peninsula. The recently completed McInnis Cement Plant is easily visible when driving along Route 132 and is an important industrial project for the region. Here the calcium-rich rock, particularly limestone, is crushed and heated to make material producing cement.



Shigawake is a farming and fishing community, settled in the 1800s by mostly Irish and Scottish people. To this day the majority of its residents are English-speaking, living in harmony with their francophone neighbours cultivating the land and harvesting the sea.

This lovely little pastoral village gets its name from the Micmac Chigouac, meaning "land of the rising sun". Indeed, the sun rises right out of Chaleur Bay here, turning the local sandstone cliffs a brilliant red.

At our tourist stop you will find families enjoying themselves playing baseball and volleyball. You can take advantage of our no service camping area. You will also appreciate strolling the footpaths through a beautiful cedar woods with lookouts on the Baie des Chaleurs & Fisherman's Wharf with picnic tables and benches. Enjoy our walking trail to the Shigawake waterfalls with picnic tables along the way.

Phantom Ship OF THE BAY OF CHALEUR

There are a number of versions of the legend of the Phantom Ship of the Bay of Chaleur. Some are colourful and exciting, though tragic. Scientists offer an explanation which lacks the intriguing possibility of ghosts and curses. You be the judge.


The sightings of the Phantom ship have occurred in a number of locations in the Bay, including the Port Daniel area. One version is about a Portuguese ship which came here in the early 1500s to capture Mi'gmaq people. The captain was killed and the ship set on fire. As the sailors jumped into the water they swore to haunt the bay for 1,000 years. The ship is reported to be seen on a full moon.

The legend from Port Daniel, more specifically, is about a group of pirates who killed a woman. As she was dying she put a curse on the pirates and wished them eternal burning on the waters of the Bay.

A third version of the Phantom, or Burning Ship, recounts a tale of a doomed ship and the sailors who blamed and murdered one of their own on board the sinking ship. When the ship then caught fire the sailors blamed the vengeance of God.

Scientific explanations also attempt to explain the sightings of the Phantom Burning Ship. One theory is that what we see on Chaleur Bay is a phenomenon known as St. Elmo's Fire. Another scientist suggests it may be caused by swamp gases. A third theory is that when we think we see the burning ship, it is caused by electrical forces.

Watch the waters of the bay, especially on a full moon and decide for yourself what you are witnessing.





Chandler is the second largest town on the Gaspé, after the town of Gaspé, with a population of 7,700. This area is one of the first areas settled on the Gaspé Coast. It was destroyed in 1758 by General James Wolfe and rebuilt by 1860. In 1912 Percy Chandler built the first pulp and paper mill on the Gaspé. It has a magnificent church, as do most Gaspesian towns. The Catholic churches tend to be large, stone churches, while the English churches, such as Anglican and United are more modest architecturally, but just as beautiful and charming. A shopping mall and many restaurants are available in Chandler.







Percé has been chosen as one of the "Most Beautiful Villages of Quebec". No vacation to the Gaspé is complete without a visit to and many photos of Percé Rock. A visit by boat to Bonaventure Island and around "The Rock" will provide beautiful memories and photo opportunities of your vacation to the Gaspé. Percé includes a number of smaller communities, such as, Barachois, Cap-d'Espoir and Val-d'Espoir. Many lovely and quaint shops, restaurants and bird watching opportunities offer a full day in the town of Percé. Wear comfortable shoes. You will be doing a lot of walking! Be sure to visit the Corner of the Beach Historial Museum in the former St. Lukes Anglican Church.





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
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
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






- Go for the unusual. Take photos of your feet in the Gaspé beach sand, sitting on a chair, walking on a trail, in sandals, hiking boots or running shoes.
- 2 Snap lots of photos. If you are using a cell phone or an iPad take lots of selfies. Then keep just your favourites.
- Place your face in the top corner, rather than in the middle of the frame. This will highlight the scenery behind you.
- Pick a theme for your selfies. For example, take all selfies of you in or around water. Do be extra careful with these shots. Do not drop your phone into the water!

- Another theme for your selfies: you and a variety of town signs.
- Don't want a double chin in your selfies? Push your neck forward. Try shooting your selfies from above and look upwards. Also, try tilting your head.
- Use a Photo App to perfect your selfies. Try Photosynth, PhotoPad, BeFunky Photo Editor, Instagram and others. All listed here are free apps.





As you travel towards the town of Gaspé you will pass through scenic Douglastown, Haldimand York Centre and Wakeham. Douglastown, located just 15 minutes south east of the town of Gaspé, is the home of many musical events, so check in The Gaspé Spec newspaper for upcoming shows and music festivals in many areas that you will visit. Douglastown has one of the largest Irish Catholic communities on the Gaspé region. A festival celebrating the Irish heritage is held every August. Watch for a barachois, a coastal lagoon which is separated from the water by sand formations, that is over 2 ½ km long. Wakeham is named for William Wakeham, a doctor and fisheries inspector who resided in the area.

The town of Gaspé has a population of just over 15,000. Be sure to visit la Musée de la Gaspésie. Also visit the cross which signifies the visit by Jacques Cartier in 1534 who claimed the area for France. The Site d'Interprétation Mi'gmaq de Gespeg offers an indoor exhibit and reconstructed dwellings which inform the visitor about the indigenous people of the Gaspé. During WWII the deep harbour of Gaspé was used by British and Canadian navies. Today you may spot a cruise ship docked there. Two shopping centres and numerous restaurants are available. The town also has a hospital and a CEGEP (Community College).

Between July 7 and 9, several tall ships will visit Gaspé, including the Bluenose II. What a great opportunity!







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It is estimated that there are about 350 species of birds to be sighted on the Gaspé Peninsula. If you take your birdwatching seriously you might want to purchase a book to help with identifying our birds. You could invest in a pair of binoculars which can be used for watching all sorts of wildlife here on the Gaspé.

robins, wrens, swallows, sparrows, grosbeaks, jays, ravens, crows, eagles, falcons, woodpeckers, owls, osprey, gulls, sandpipers, plovers, gannets, cormorants, hummingbirds, wild turkeys, ducks, Canada Geese, and seagulls.

You might want to keep a list of the birds you spot and when possible a photo of each bird. No trip to the Gaspé is complete without a trip by boat to Bonaventure Island to see the gannets that nest there. Though almost 300 species of birds have been recorded as visiting or living on Bonaventure Island the most common bird is the gannet. In fact, one of the largest gannet colonies in the world is found there, almost 100,000! Helpful hint: the aroma of many birds can be overwhelming. Take along Vicks Vaporub and put a dab in each nostril.

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BASIC FRENCH

French is the official language of Quebec. When visiting the Gaspé you will hear French and English and possibly some Mi'gmaq. Many Gaspesian residents are bilingual. If you know how to speak some French, just go for it, give it a try. People respond positively if you attempt to communicate in French. CBC has a weekly program, C'est la vie, and it is a great intro to speaking French and offers a word of the week segment. It will, at very least, attune your ear to the French language.


