
# The next generation is on its way

CHANDLER: - The many monitored beaches in the area have one thing in common: they need a lifeguard with ocean rescue training to operate. Haldimand, Pabos, Pabos Mills, and Newport are some examples of beaches where the necessary qualifications of the rescuers exceed those of people working in swimming pools or on the beaches of lakes.

"You have to know how to deal with ocean conditions, waves, currents. It's really something else," says Dominique Giroux, head of ocean rescue training. This year, a record was set when 11 rescuers completed their ocean rescue training in Chandler. This news delighted Dominique Giroux.

In recent years, the staff was limited. The succession was far from assured, especially as the number of monitored beaches has increased. With so many new rescuers graduating, Ms. Giroux is reassured of the maintenance of services.



# Sylvain Roy launches campaign with energy, in the wake of receiving cancer diagnosis

CARLETON: - Incumbent Member of the National Assembly for the riding of Bonaventure, Sylvain Roy, launched his electoral campaign with vigour on August 27, despite his fight against cancer. That launch was made almost two weeks after a media report revealed that he was diagnosed with throat cancer.

Mr. Roy was in "great shape," by his own admission and assures us that he is not feeling the effects of cancer so

"I am not lying on a hospital bed. I am feeling very well. My treatments will start on September 5 at Hôtel-Dieu Hospital in Quebec City. I am supposed to feel hungover for six weeks from that point. (...) Nobody reacts the same way to the treatments though. I cannot predict the impact. It would have been worse for my health

Former minister Yves Duhaime will be helping September 11 to 13, Rimouski riding Member of the National Assembly (MNA) Harold Lebel on September 14, and Matane riding MNA Pascal Bérubé will also assist but the date has not yet been announced.

Sylvain Roy will take this opportunity while receiving radiotherapy and chemotherapy treatments to conduct his own study on how the health system works and why it fails in some aspects.

"It took five months between my first diagnosis, received in April, and the start of my treatments, in September. The last diagnosis confirmed my cancer in July. It remains a lot of time, two months (before treatments). Psychologically, it is a drag, but I am not complaining because I am lucky. I have my wife with me and some more support. I am thinking of people who are alone in that kind of journey. I will run that study as a sociologist and as an MNA," he points out.

He is already a big critic of Minister Gaétan Barrette's health system reform.

"There is a unidirectional line of communications between Ouebec City and the regions. They have laid off numerous professionals who were very helpful in early diagnosis and treatments. Now, a patient has to go to the emergency to receive treatments, at a much higher cost, that could have been provided before the deterioration of the case," he

He says that a Parti Québécois government would improve the representation of the population in the health system and put emphasis on preven-

# First Green Party candidate to run at provincial level in Bonaventure

SHIGAWAKE: – For the first time, Quebec's Green Party will have a candidate in the riding of Bonaventure. Heather Imhoff, a 26-year-old holder of a bachelor's degree in environmental science, was raised in New Carlisle and now resides in Shigawake.

Ms. Imhoff is currently a supply teacher at the Eastern Shores School Board. Before getting her degree at Concordia University, she had received a Cegep degree in environmental and wildlife management from Vanier College.

"I am running for the Green Party because I care about my community as well as the environment and I believe that, with perseverance, we can succeed at preserving our beautiful Coast," she says about the reasons behind her political involvement.

Unlike most other Bonaventure riding candidates, Heather Imhoff has not organized an official launch. "My campaign will be mostly on-

line. I don't really have the resources to conduct a large campaign," she explains.

When asked to pinpoint her Gaspé Peninsula priorities, she mentions that "my three main regional priorities are: repair the tracks so the train can return to the Coast, insure safe town drinking water for all municipalities, and protect the region's vitality by attracting and keeping the youth in the

Living on the Gaspé Coast after her studies was always a target. "From the day I left for school, I knew I would come back to the Coast simply because it is my home and there is nothing like home," underlines Ms. Imhoff.



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## Where would the Bourque gas go?

GASPÉ: – Pieridae Energy is planning to transport an eventual gas production from its Bourque property, between Grande-Vallée and Murdochville, to a future liquid natural gas terminal in Nova Scotia, report the company documents. The project of a liquefaction vessel in Gaspé isn't mentioned, a situation the Côte-de-Gaspé prefect describes as "concerning."

In a document presented last June to its shareholders, Pieridae's management doesn't mention the project prepared with a Quebec firm, Tugliq. Both companies wanted to transport the gas by pipeline to a liquefaction vessel located at the Sandy Beach port, in Gaspé, and then to ship the liquefied natural gas to the North Shore. The project had been welcomed by the Côte-de-Gaspé mayors at the end of 2015.

In its documents, Albertabased Pieridae, which merged with Pétrolia last year, now draws a future connecting pipeline between the Quebec and the New Brunswick section of the Maritimes and Northeast Pipeline. The Bourque project is presented as one of the sources to feed its Goldboro terminal project, in southeast Nova Scotia.

Côte-de-Gaspé prefect Daniel Côté met Pieridae representatives two months ago. "Behind closed doors, we've been told that the (Tugliq) project is still alive but in their public statements, for some time, we've been hearing less and less about it," he says.

Mr. Côté is "concerned" about that situation. "It would have an impact on the social acceptability if they only extract and if there's no first transformation, that is to say a liquefaction of the resource."

In its document, Pieridae also mentions that it could go on exploring at Haldimand No. 1 well, in Gaspé, based on the Quebec government regulation.

Prefect Côté disagrees with that statement. "The government has been very clear. Whether this is Haldimand No 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6, it's finished, they must understand that. (...) There's no social acceptability no matter which line of attack we choose. The buffer distances between drillings and water courses, or between drillings and houses... We'll do every-

thing to prevent (further oil and gas development in Haldimand)."

There are two other Pieridae wells in Haldimand: No. 2 and 4. The new regulation forbids further work on those wells because they are too close to houses.

The same Pieridae document also mentions Bourque: "permitting work for fracking to be done in 2019" and "initial production testing in 2019."

Only two wells were drilled on the Bourque property. Production tests established the presence of oil and gas in the reservoir, but it is too tight for hydrocarbons to naturally flow in a profitable way.

Pieridae also mentions the Gaspesia project, where there's "seismic work to be completed in 2018 if permits are obtained before year end." The Gaspesia project is located in the Dunière and Matane reserves.

## German funding?

Pieridae is trying to obtain loans guaranteed for up to \$3.8 billion from the German federal ministry for economic affairs and energy in order to build its liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminal in Nova Scotia. In return, Pieridae would reserve a part of its production for Germany.

More than 25 Canadian and German environmental groups are protesting funding that supports fracturing. They wrote a letter to the German Environment and Economy Ministers asking them not to provide this guarantee.

The guarantee could allow Pierdiae to build its Goldboro terminal, says Carole Dupuis of the Regroupement vigilance hydrocarbures Québec. A part of the natural gas would come from Quebec "where fracturing will be allowed on the Gaspé, in Lower St. Lawrence and in every place where there's no shale."

"The risks posed by fracturing are known as well as the contribution of natural gas to climate warming. It would be a game of make-believe, where we all pretend to become greener," Ms. Dupuis adds.

Pieridae mentions that it has signed a twenty-year agreement with German company Uniper about the purchase of 5 million metric tons of gas per year, that is to say half the capacity of its terminal project. The terminal would cost \$10.8 billion. It would liquefy gas from western Canada (74%), Eastern Canada, including the Gaspé (13%), and the Marcellus shale in New England (13%).

Environnement vert plus spokesperson Pascal Bergeron states that there's "a lot of bluff" in the Pieridae statements. "Pieridae is trying to get German funding and all their announcements are designed for this purpose. (...) But nothing is secured: neither the gas transport nor the development of gas fields."

However, Mr. Bergeron worries about the possibility that Pieridae get a part of the requested funding, and could use it to develop oil and gas in the Gaspé Peninsula. "It would mean a terrible acceleration in (oil and gas) development in the Gaspé. It's now clear that Pieridae wants to use fracturing and that the government will allow it. Everything is put in place for the Gaspésie to be sacrificed." Pieridae didn't return our call.

# Police report

On August 27 at the Percé courthouse, Dominyck Terry Beaudin, 23, from Sainte-Thérèse-de-Gaspé, entered a plea of guilty on charges of aggravated assault on a three-month-old baby and criminal negligence.

According to the medical information on file, the baby could have to live with serious consequences as a result of the assault. The events took place on February 24 and 26, 2018 when the accused was taking care of the baby. The baby was brought to Chandler hospital and because of its critical condition was transferred by plane to St. Justine Hospital in Montreal. Examinations and tests revealed numerous problems such as intra-cranial bleeding, intra-labial tear, acute fracture of the left shoulder, fracture of the clavicle and scapula, knee, ankle and foot fractures, older rib fractures which were healing, bruises, a mouth injury, chin scratches and hematomas. According to reports summarized by Richard Hotton, the child will probably have hearing problems such as hearing loss, locomotion problems, and he could suffer from vision problems, considering that he barely responds to light. Additional medical reports are expected. Sentencing is set to October 24. A pre-sentence report will be available no later than October 18.

Marie-Eve Beaupré, 32, from Chandler, will return to the Percé courthouse on September 24 to enter a plea. She allegedly hit a woman with a baseball bat at the beach near the marina in Chandler on July 29, and was charged with attempted murder. She also allegedly uttered death threats to a peace officer. She is also charged with assault causing bodily harm and having inflicted injuries to two other individuals.

On August 28 at the New Carlisle courthouse, the bail hearing of Randie Nappaaluk, 21, from Bonaventure, charged with attempted murder, forcible confinement, wilfully causing injuries to an animal and uttering death threats was postponed to September 11, 2018.

Sûreté du Québec investigators are conducting an inquiry regarding four thefts of vehicles that occurred during the weekend of August 3-4-5. "The four vehicles were stolen in Chandler, Shigawake, Matapedia and Amqui. The car stolen in Shigawake was found in Amqui. Three of the four vehicles were retrieved. We don't think there is a link between the four thefts but we are not sure. There is a fair distance between the locations where the thefts were committed. We don't have suspects in those cases but the investigation is still ongoing," says Sgt. Claude Doiron, spokesperson for the Sûreté du Québec.

Roger Dupuis, 80, from the Rivière-au Renard sector of Gaspé was found dead on August 29 on the side of Chemin de la colonie Sainte-Julienne, a secondary road, eight kilometres northwest of Corte Real. The victim was travelling on the forested area road in a side-by-side all-terrain vehicle when he lost control. According to Sgt. Claude Doiron, "The vehicle overturned and the victim was ejected from it. Did he faint before that happened? We don't know. A passer-by saw the vehicle and the man, and called the emergency services. He was sent to the hospital where he was pronounced dead."

Found at about 4:45 p.m., the body of Mr. Dupuis showed signs of injuries, in all likelihood because the ATV rolled on him. "The vehicle rolled several times. The victim was not wearing a helmet and had not fastened his seat belt. He was crushed by the vehicle. (...) There will be no autopsy. The victim lost control of the vehicle and there was no smell of alcohol detected on the body."

#### **Exaggeration does** not serve the **Liberal Party cause**

**Drop into Spec's Book Room** Monday to Friday 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Great second-hand books 208-B Gerard D. Levesque, New Carlisle to Donald Trump. That was downright odious, considering that the American president is suspected of having assaulted 19 women.

Mr. Legault is far from always in tune with today's Quebec reality. During the 2012 electoral campaign, he was behind in women's voting intentions and awkwardly explained the phenomenon by women's fear of the changes he was proposing.

Six years later, his party leads in women's voting intentions. That might explain the Liberal Party exaggerations at his expense.

Politics are quite often dirty. A higher presence of women might change politics and make them cleaner over the long term. We can certainly wish that, however, politics will remain a tough game and the remarks of Marwab Rizky and Christine Saint-Pierre are not endowing the quality of exchanges. It is like sticking to dirty old tactics. There is no evolution here.

Women have a better chance of standing out in politics if they accept to play a tough game, without asking to be treated differently, and also through contributing to an elevation of the way politicians exchange between one another. It is like walking on a tight rope but it will yield better results than throwing insults the way Ms. Rizky and Ms. Saint-Pierre, a former minister responsible of Women's condition, did.

Premier Philippe Couillard committed in 2014 to alter the tone of the exchanges between politicians. He has frequently failed so far and will have to lead by example at one point. Affirming that Marwab Rizky and Christine Saint-Pierre can say what they want was not his most inspired quote of the

The premier could have limited his statement to criticizing the fact that François Legault has prevented his candidate, Marguerite Blais, from participating in debates.

The Liberal Party's austerity measures between 2014 and 2017 hit women's living conditions more than men's, as nurses and teachers, in fields, education and health, where they are overrepresented, were the targets of important budgetary cuts. It is also a well-documented reality that women working as government's chiefs of staff are earning \$17,000 less than their male counterparts. Are you taking notes, Mr. Couillard?

François Legault is far from perfect. He has huge shortcomings in regional development, in environment policies and in general knowledge of the civil servants' conditions, among others. He is no Donald Trump though.

# What are the candidates saying...

GASPÉ: – The candidates of the Liberal Party, Parti québécois and Québec solidaire in the Gaspé riding presented their commitments during the first week of the electoral campaign. Here is an overview of their promises.

#### Parti québécois: Méganne Perry-Mélançon

The Parti québécois (PQ) candidate wants to make the lives of youths and their parents easier. She wants to offer a tax credit to parents whose children study outside the region, in order to compensate for such expenses as rent costs.

She wasn't able to provide details: "I am committed to work on it, but we don't know the technicalities yet. We want equity between the parents of urban centres and the parents of rural areas."

While her Liberal opponent Alexandre Boulay promised "university poles" in the region, Ms. Perry-Mélançon considers that we have to "focus on existing educational institutions and develop DEC-BAC gateways (gateways between Cegep diplomas and bachelor's degrees)." For families, Ms. Perry-Mélançon wants to make sure that spots are created for the youngest toddlers in day cares. For the elderly, she

support workers.

Regarding oil and gas development, the PQ candidate commits to holding a BAPE process on the ongoing regional projects in general (a "generic" BAPE). The Bureau d'audiences publiques sur l'environnement (BAPE) would determine the future of those projects. She would close the door to any other new oil and gas project.

Ms. Perry-Mélançon, 28 years old, from Gaspé, is in the process of completing a bachelor's degree in business administration at Laval University and was a former employee of the current Member of the Na-Assembly, Gaétan Lelièvre, between 2014 and 2016.

#### **Ouébec Solidaire: Alexis-Dumont-Blanchet**

The Québec solidaire can-Alexis didate, Dumontlaunched Blanchet, campaign in Gaspé. According to him, the way to the future of the peninsula isn't through "a miracle solution," but through "several small actions." "The ideas to develop the Gaspé Coast will come from the brains of Gaspesians," he says but in order to achieve results,

promises to improve the proximity services in some localities and support caregivers by increasing the number of home

Ouébec solidaire would set up a Gaspé Peninsula-Magdalen Islands regional developcommittee, where ment representatives of municipal councils, social and economic sectors and civil society could work together. "At least 50% of the members would be citizens," Mr. Dumont-Blanchet states. Moreover, the Ouebec government would provide them with budgets to operate and to invest in projects.

Gaspesians must "talk to each

other."

To develop the Gaspé Coast, the QS candidate will promote short circuits. "If all Gaspesians ate Gaspesian carrots, imagine how many jobs would be created, and how much land would be occupied," he illustrated.

Mr. Dumont-Blanchet reminds the voters that his party supports Quebec's independence as well as creating a universal dental coverage and raising the minimum wage to \$15 per hour. Free education from day care to university, as well as a "necessary greening (emphasis on the environment), are also QS priorities."

The QS candidate is from Cap-Chat. He works as a community organizer for the Gaspésie health and social services centre.

#### **Liberal Party: Alexandre Boulay**

Liberal candidate Alexandre Boulay presented his commitments for the transportation sector. If elected, he would make sure that "the region gets its fair share," in road investments, he says.

As a Member of the National Assembly, Mr. Boulay would suggest "solutions to speed up the railway file... To do work in winter can have an impact on the timetable. In winter, there's less traffic and it's easier to obtain structures."

Mr. Boulay described as "plausible" the return of trains to Gaspé in 2022, but refused to promise it. "I'm committed to working with people responsible for that file in order to speed it up," he says.



Alexandre Boulay, the Liberal Party candidate, wants the three airports of the Gaspé riding (Grand River, Gaspé and Sainte-Anne-des-Monts) to be modernized.

"It's not necessary to have a railway tomorrow morning, but we need to have it for a long time," Mr. Boulay stated, downplaying the question of the delays.

The Liberal Government purchased the Gaspesian railway in 2015. The Caplan-Gaspé section was put in a dormant state, which is forcing Port-Daniel's McInnis Cement and Gaspé's LM Wind Power plant to haul their cement and their blades by truck to New

Richmond, where they can be loaded on a train. The truck haul costs significantly more than train transport.

Mr. Boulay also promised to modernize the three airports of the Gaspé riding - in Grand River, Gaspé and Sainte-Annedes-Monts.



"Jonathan Fyfe in Carleton, Marc Chapados in Paspebiac, and other physical education teachers are committed to sending here some of their players next year," says Éric Huard.

The tournament itself was a great success though. "We had 45 teams, including 16 professional ones, 23 in the competition class, and six local teams. Local teams were playing according to the four against four mode, while the top levels were playing two against two," further explains Mr. Huard.

The players loved the ambiance at the Port Daniel beach. "That tournament caps their season. They played and they held their season's end party. They are not used to playing on a real beach. They usually play in parks or along the shores of lakes. They also loved playing in front of a good crowd, a crowd that followed every play and was applauding them as well. # Two French papers close after decades of publication

GASPÉ AND NEW RICH-MOND: – The two weekly French papers covering 400 kilometres of the Gaspé Coast, the Pharillon in the Côte-de-Gaspé and Percé Rock MRCs and L'Écho de la Baie in the Bay of Chaleur area, have ceased to publish, as of August 24, due to financial problems.

Both papers, formerly owned by Transcontinental, had been acquired in 2017 by a regional company, MedoMédia, which was publishing until then the Journal de l'est.

However, Lexis Media, the publisher of 17 newspapers in various regions of Quebec, is founding two additional newspapers to replace the Pharillon and L'Écho de la Baie. The Gaspésie Nouvelles and Chaleurs Nouvelles will first be published on September 5 and the eight former employees of MedoMédia are hired.

Lexis Media already owns L'Avantage gaspésien, which covers the Haute-Gaspénie and the Matane areas. "Over the last three years, Lexis learned that those Gaspesian newspapers were experiencing serious problems," explains Dominique Fortier, news editor of L'Avantage gaspésien.

The newspapers supposed to be released on August 28 were laid out on August 24 but never printed. Their websites disappeared on the latter day.

"Lexis contacted the eight employees to check if they would work for us. They accepted because there was too much uncertainty at MedoMédia," adds Mr. Fortier.

One of MedoMédia associates, Claude Dauphin, had contacted Lexis to sell the Pharillon and L'Écho de la Baie, "It never went farther than that," says Mr. Fortier, who assures ignoring why the talks failed to lead to a deal.

Lexis resolutely took a shortcut through launching two newspapers instead of two others that had just skipped publishing an issue.

Claude Dauphin has not replied to SPEC's messages. He left the Gaspé Peninsula at the beginning of the summer. He confirmed to Radio-Canada by email that he was abandoning the publication of the Pharillon and L'Écho de la Baie. Percé businessman André Méthot was the essential funding source of the company but he is experiencing health problems that have forced him to leave the company.

Radio Rocher Percé, a small radio station based in Percé and airing for tourist purposes, was no longer active as of August 29. It was also owned by MedoMédia. The website was also deactivated.

The Pharillon had been founded in 1973 after claims made by citizens regrouped under the name Diffusion-Gaspésie. They were advocating for better information services at the tip of the Gaspé Peninsula. L'Écho de la Baie was founded in the 1980s. Chandler's newspaper Le Havre had been amalgamated with the Pharillon over the spring.

Éric Huard.

It will come back. The players loved it. They were also very pleased with their party. We had invited two nationally known DJs," adds Mr. Huard.

The attendance reached 500 people during certain games, he says. "It can only pick up, and the youth that will come to the camp next year will contribute to that as well," he concludes.



## Recycling crisis could represent an opportunity

GRAND RIVER: - The crisis experienced by the recycling industry in Quebec is being seen as an opportunity to restructure it more effectively, says Nathalie Drapeau, director of the Régie intermunicipale de traitement des matières résiduelles Gaspésie.

That municipal body manages the waste of the households located in the Percé Rock and Côte-de-Gaspé MRCs.

Nathalie Drapeau knows the tune: the demand, especially from China, is no longer there for mixed fibre and plastic bags, which causes major storage issues in the province. Organizations in charge of recuperation are waiting to find opportunities to evaluate the material.

"We are looking for a storage location near the sorting centre. It's additional management that we have to do," she says.

Quebec has allocated \$10 million to help the sorting centres face the crisis. "The money will be spread over for a residue that no one several quarters but, to date, we have touched a little less than \$10,000 in Grand River," adds Ms. Drapeau.

She emphasizes in the experienced.

same breath that she operates one of the smallest centres, which explains the amount received.

However, far from adopting a defeatist attitude in the situation, Ms. Drapeau sees the situation as an opportunity.

"This is an opportunity for us to mobilize, find solutions at home and no longer depend on international markets," she says. "With the decrease in the use of newsprint and the increase in the availability of other fibres, it is the entire recycling community that must review its methods. Cascades, Kruger, everyone is reassessing the situation and I believe that promising initiatives will emerge soon," says Nathalie Drapeau.

Cascades and Kruger are two important paper producers using a significant proportion of recuperated fibre.

At the Régie intermunicipale de traitement des matières résiduelles Gaspésie, a first transformation of glass by grinding is now in motion which gives it a better resale value and broadens the market wanted. According to Ms. Drapeau, it is a question of time but she sees with optimism the situation currently

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

1/4 teaspoon Italian seasoning


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- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- cup Clean & Hungry Marinara Sauce (see below) 1
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1. Preheat the oven to 375 F. Lay a large piece of heavy-duty foil on a baking sheet and spray with nonstick spray.



# New Richmond Fair draws slightly fewer people but results remains sound

NEW RICHMOND: – The New Richmond Agricultural Fair drew slightly fewer people than in 2017 but that drop doesn't affect the future of the event, assures its president, Kyle Bujold. The event was held between August 23 and the 26 inclusively.

"We were expecting about the same number of attendees as last year. We usually greet between 1,500 and 2,000 people. We noticed that we had fewer people at night for the dances and shows. We had about half less people than last year. We don't know why exactly. I don't think it is the heat. It was hot during the day but the evenings were cooler," explains Kyle Bujold.

The activities held during the day were very popular in general.

"Sunday, for example, was very busy and it's normal because there are many activities that day. Overall, we are satisfied because what really matters for the board members is that people are happy when they leave the fair-grounds, after they had fun in a safe place," he adds.

The Gymkhana competitions, the single horse haul, the washer toss tournament, the increasingly popular lawn-mowing tractor race and the "Kidz zone" were particularly popular over the weekend.

Budget-wise, the New Richmond Agricultural Society organizes the fair and maintains the buildings with \$13,000 per year. The slight shortcomings in revenues stemming from the drop in attendance shouldn't pose a problem.

"We had rebuilt some fences and we had carried out a few repairs here and there. We were expecting the same revenues as last year but we will just have to be careful in managing the money. Year in, year out, we have practically no money left when the fair is about to begin," points out Kyle Bujold.
