

Murdochville wells are running dry

MURDOCHVILLE: – Since the beginning of October, Murdochville residents have had to boil their water before drinking it and are being encouraged to conserve water. The dry summer weather caused the water levels in the municipal artesian wells to drop. The Municipality is compensating by drawing water from a lake.

Two of the four underground water wells are dry, says the Murdochville director of public works, André Minville. "In the fall, water in our wells is generally lower (than at other periods). However, I've been working at the Town since 2004 and it's the first time that it is so low. I also have an employee who has been here for 35 years and he had never seen it."

Murdochville is continuing to use water from the two remaining wells, but also uses the water from Lake Porphyre, the Town's former water supply. "I currently draw 75% of Murdochville's water from the wells and 25% from the lake," states Mr. Minville.

The director of public works is not afraid of running short of water this winter, because there's plenty of it in the lake. However, he's asking the residents to conserve

the water in order to protect the wells. As a result of his call, the consumption of water in Murdochville went from 750 cubic metres to 600 cubic metres per day. There are 650 residents in the town.

The boil water advisory remains in effect since the drinking water is partly composed of surface water, which increases the risk of contamination.

Murdochville chlorinates its water to eliminate germs,

and is sending samples to a Rimouski laboratory once a week, in order to detect eventual coliforms or E. coli bacteria. The results are sent to the Quebec Environment Ministry and to the regional Public Health Department. Depending on the results, Murdochville will lift or keep its boil water advisory, explains Mr. Minville.

He hopes that it will be possible to lift the advisory in the coming weeks, but it's also possible that it will remain in force until next spring, when the snow thaw will raise the wells' water level.

Louis-Charles Rainville, who is responsible for environmental health at the regional Public Health department, emphasizes that their historical data regarding the quality of drinking water from Lake Porphyre is not available. "We're going to collect that data over the next months (through the weekly samples)."

According to Mr. Rainville, the absence of data "calls for caution". The data will be examined in the middle of the winter, probably around February. The department is going to suggest waiting until this review before lifting the boil water advisory, states Mr. Rainville.

Two criteria must be examined before lifting it, Mr. Rainville explains. There must be a better knowledge of fecal water contamination in the lake, and a better knowledge of the removal rate of bacteria, parasites and viruses through water chlorination.

A risk of gastro-enteritis is related to drinking surface water, especially for toddlers and seniors, states Mr. Rainville.

Murdochville residents are not only boiling their water, but are also buying a lot of bottled water. "Last week the four litre container was on sale. I sold almost two pallets," that is to say about 500 bottles, states Michel Pelletier, owner of the Murdochville grocery store.

As a citizen, "we changed our habits to conserve water. We take shorter showers, we shut off the tap while we soap, and our children do it too," says Mr. Pelletier.



Municipal budget doubles due to taxes from McInnis Cement

PORT DANIEL-GASCONS: – The municipal value of the McInnis Cement plant is now assessed at \$180 million, which almost doubles the budget of Port Daniel-Gascons. This will provide financing for many projects in the town of 2,700 people.

Since 2016, McInnis Cement has been making payments to the town. This amount was estimated because the construction of the plant was not yet completed. In addition, Servitech, the appraisal firm, had not finished assessing the value of the plant.

Those advance payments were \$300,000 in 2016 and \$1 million for each of the following two years.

"On January 1, the plant had a municipal value of \$86 million which corresponds to a tax payment of \$1 million. On March 1, the plant was worth \$104 million. After its last evaluation, Servitech determined that the plant's value was \$186 million on October 1, 2017, as the construction was completed," explains Henri Grenier, mayor of Port Daniel-Gascons.

The rising value of the facility during the construction and completion means that McInnis Cement owed \$1.5 million in back payments for 2017 and 2018 to the municipality. This amounts to \$500,000 for last year and \$1 million for this year.

"Before McInnis Cement, our annual budget was \$2.3 million per year. Our budget has almost doubled now. Next year, McInnis Cement must pay \$2.1 million, which will bring our budget to \$4.4 million," adds Mayor Grenier.

Servitech's results were accepted by McInnis Cement. Maryse Tremblay, spokesper-

There is a significant difference between \$1.5 billion, the sum invested between 2014 and 2018 in the project, and the municipal value of the Port Daniel plant.

"All the equipment used in production is not included in the municipal value of a plant... Calculating the municipal value of such a plant is a very complex procedure," points out Henri Grenier.

The mayor states that a municipal budget that increases two-fold makes it much easier for the Town to fund projects.

The first project will provide a drinkable water system in Gascons, a \$28.6 million initiative. The province will likely contribute \$26.6 million towards the total. The municipal contribution will be \$2 million. This corresponds to the annual increase the municipality is receiving in tax revenue. "It is less of a concern considering our new source of funding," says Henri Grenier.

"We have several projects coming up. In 2015, we consulted the citizens of the municipality in order to create a development plan. In 2017, we invested \$3.5 million in our municipal roads. We received grants covering 75% and sometimes 90% of the cost. This came from (provincial) programs, however, the money coming from our new municipal taxes will be used as leverage," explains the mayor.

The upgrading of Marcil Road, a priority for the residents of Port Daniel West, was completed. "The road is now paved between Highway 132 and the Sixth range," says Mr. Grenier.

A 12-unit apartment building for people aged 65 years and over, and another 24-unit building for people aged 73 and up, are in the planning stages. They will be managed by not-for-profit organizations. "They are estimated to cost \$7 million and a municipal contribution will support those projects as well. Although the exact amount is not yet known," says Mr. Grenier.

"We are also planning the creation of an industrial zone with the collaboration of McInnis Cement. We are also working on a project to relocate our fire station and our municipal garage to the former arena, at a cost of \$3.3 million. Improvements are also planned for the Gascons community centre," he adds.

"At first, people were expecting more from the cement plant, and sooner. What is currently happening is highly positive but things don't happen overnight. It will take years before we make our municipality more attractive," concludes Henri Grenier.

son for McInnis Cement said "The assessment was carried out jointly with our appraisers."

The construction of the Port Daniel cement plant required an investment of \$1.5 billion, including a \$444 million cost overrun revealed in June 2016. McInnis Cement has been controlled since August 2016 by the Caisse de dépôt et de du Québec placement (CDPQ). The CDPQ also invested in marine terminals located near Montreal, in Ontario and in New York. Those three terminals are included in the total cost of the venture.

Police report

Marie-Ève Beaupré, 33, from Chandler, accused of attempted murder, assault and uttering death threats, will be back in court on November 29. A preliminary hearing is requested regarding the events that occurred on July 29 at the Chandler beach. The accused allegedly attempted to end another person's life by hitting her with a baseball bat, uttering death threats and she repeated the same threats to a police officer. The witnesses will be heard at the Percé courthouse on November 29 to allow the judge to determine whether there will be a trial or not in this case. The accused remains incarcerated until the conclusion of the procedure.

Charged with possession, distribution and transmission of child pornography to people aged under 18, Olivier Cassivi-Reeves, 18, of Gaspé, will be evaluated by the medical staff at the request of the defence. His next appearance will take place on November 29 in Percé. He is remanded in custody until then. The young man has not yet pleaded guilty or not guilty to the charges laid against him.

Éric Desbois, 33, from Chandler, was arrested on November 5 and charged the following day with possession of cocaine and methamphetamine for the purpose of trafficking. On November 8, he appeared for a second time at the Percé courthouse and was charged with possession of cannabis for the purpose of trafficking. The man was arrested after a long Sûreté du Québec investigation and is remanded in custody at least until his next court appearance, scheduled for November 26. The investigation was conducted by the police officers based at the Percé Rock MRC detachment.

Éric Desbois was arrested in Chandler in his vehicle, as it was parked at a local business. A search of his vehicle led to the seizure of slightly more than seven grams of cocaine, 88 methamphetamine pills, 35 grams of cannabis, an undetermined quantity of ecstasy and some cash. His vehicle was also seized following the drug bust.

"Some people are under the impression that possession of cannabis is permitted since the coming into force of the new law (on October 17) but it doesn't work that way. The drug has to come from a legal outlet and you cannot sell cannabis freely. Selling cannabis can still lead to quite severe prison terms," explains Richard Hottot, crown prosecutor at the Percé courthouse.

Sûreté du Québec officers of the Côte-de-Gaspé MRC detachment are currently investigating a hit and run case that occurred at about 4:30 p.m. on November 6 on Forillon Boulevard, in the area of Rosebridge. The driver of a car made a dangerous move while passing two cars because another vehicle was coming in the other direction. Seeing that he wouldn't be able to pass both cars, the driver decided to slip between the two cars he was trying to pass and hit the front car. The driver of that vehicle lost control and the car ended up in the ditch.

Mesgi'g Ugju's'n receives award

GESGAPEGIAG: - The Mesgi'g Ugju's'n Wind Farm recently received an award from the Canadian Wind Energy Association in the Wind project category. The first place award was presented during the 34th Annual CanWEA Conference and Exhibition held in Calgary October 23 to October 25.

Pattern Energy's Parc éolien Mont Sainte-Marguerite and Parc éolien Nicolas-Riou, spearheaded by EDF Renewable Canada and Alliance éolienne de l'Est were also finalists. The Mesgi'g Ugju's'n wind farm was developed by the Mi'gmaq communities of Listuguj, Gesgapegiag and Gespeg with Innergex as a partner.

While attending the Calgary event, Nadia Robertson, chair of the Mesgi'g Ugju's'n wind farm and a Mi'gmaq from Gespeg, said that "receiving this award and being acknowledged for our wind project gives the Mi'gmaq communities of Gesgapegiag, Gespeg and Listuguj great pride and I feel that it will resonate in Canada and generate inspiration for other communities but mainly for our people in Gespe'gewa'gi. This project is a success because when the project started, "we weren't thinking of building a wind farm, we had the intention of building a nation." Accompanying Ms. Robertson in Calgary were Gesgapegiag councilor Anthony Jerome, Listuguj councilor Sky Metallic, Donald Jeannotte-Anglehart from Gespeg, Jeannette Martin, of the Migmawei Mawiomi Business Corporation board of directors and Christianne Bernard, chief executive officer of the Migmawei Mawiomi Business Corporation (MMBC).

Officials of the MMBC also recognize "all the tremendous efforts of former employees in management, administration, construction, environmental monitoring, and every individual that participated in this project, including former leadership. These individuals have passed the torch to the present leadership, management, administration and operations workers, including the service technicians who are from the communities and region. Together with Innergex and all the operations staff, MU will continue to achieve milestones."

The wind farm project was started by the Mi'gmaq. They later selected Innergex, through a vetting process, as their partner.

The three Mi'gmaq communities and Innergex began constructing the 150 megawatt project in the back country of Escuminac in 2015, and kick started the operations in December 2016. Up to \$330 million were invested in the venture.

Mesgi'g Ugju's'n means "big wind" in the Mi'gmaq language, and it is the first wind farm developed in the Gaspé Peninsula in partnership with an Indigenous community.

During construction, the project employed 389 people, 113 of whom came from Mi'gmag communities and an addi-225 from tional the surrounding region and province. The project will generate more than \$200 million in revenue for the Mi'gmaq communities over the two coming decades.

The Mi'gmawei Mawiomi Business Corporation (MMBC) is the general partner of the Mi'gmawei Mawiomi Resources Limited Partnership (MMRLP), whose three shareholders are the Micmac Nation of Gespeg, the Micmacs of Gesgapegiag and the Listuguj Mi'gmaq Government. It is MMBC that manages the Mesgi'g Ugju's'n wind farm for the Mi'gmaq and Innergex manages the operations.

The driver responsible didn't stay at the scene of the accident. Witnesses believe that he was driving a grey Mazda 3, a car that should have damage on the front bumper. The two occupants of the vehicle which left the road were not injured. The Sûreté du Québec investigators in charge of the case are asking potential witnesses to pass on to them any information that could lead to the arrest of the hit and run driver, including people who may have seen the grey Mazda 3 in the minutes leading to or following the accident. There are more victims of war than we think

The 2018 Remembrance Day ceremony marked the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I on November 11, 1918. For the first time ever, the Canadian Legion has chosen a mother who lost a child to suicide for the year-long designation of 2018 National Silver Cross mother.

The National Silver Cross Mother represents all mothers who have lost children in the military service of Canada. Anita Cenerini received that distinction after having fought so her son Private Thomas Welch, could receive full military honours. After serving in Afghanistan in 2003, the 22-year-old man ended his life on May 8, 2004, at the army base in Petawawa, Ontario.

It is disturbing that a mother has to fight in order for her son or daughter to receive full military honours after committing suicide, during or after serving in the Canadian Armed Forces. It is especially disturbing in the case of troops having been based in some of the most challenging locations in the world. Afghanistan most certainly fit that description 15 years ago.

The Canadian Armed Forces has certainly improved the way it treats their members and veter-

ans over the years. Better psychological support is offered nowadays, while those services were often non-existant a generation ago.

However, there is still room for huge improvements in the way the Canadian Armed Forces and the Canadian government, in general, treat servicemen and women

First of all, there is the way the Canadian Armed Forces has hidden and handled those suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder.

There is more. In Shannon, the community located next to the Valcartier base, near Quebec City, residents in parts of the village are 249% more likely than others to develop cancer, according to one medical expert's analysis of a public health study. Those numbers were gathered by Dr. Claude Tremblay, who represents Shannon residents on an experts' committee reviewing the impact of trichloroethylene (TCE) contamination in some local wells.

TCE is used as a degreasing agent. In 1997, it was discovered to have leached into the drinking water supply system at the Valcartier base and it was detected in private wells in Shannon three years later. Some Shannon wells have recorded levels of TCE that are up to 180 times the level judged acceptable by Health Canada. The Canadian government has been fighting against the claims of Shannon residents for almost two decades now. Shall we remember that it is a rather deplorable way to treat people, whether they are in the service or not?

In Gagetown, New Brunswick, a CBC report revealed earlier this year that 40 barrels of Agent Orange, a very powerful defoliant, were buried secretly in 1985. The barrels were full or half-full, and some of them were in a decayed state. Agent Orange had been sprayed experimentally at Gagetown in 1966 and 1967 by the United States army, with permission from the Canadian Armed Forces.

Since then, hundreds of former Canadian soldiers have complained about the side effects stemming from contact with Agent Orange. One of those side effects being various types of cancer. Our authorities, whether we are talking about the Canadian Armed Forces or the federal government, probably both, have conducted several legal battles against those veterans. We shall remember that too.

Time will almost undoubtedly prove that the victims of those scandals are right. The hypocrisy of some of our government officials is unbelievable considering their inability to recognize the obvious and yet they are present at every Remembrance Day ceremony.

It is not always clear why a failure to recognize past mistakes such as the Shannon and Gagetown cases, to name a few, would hurt politicians and military officials.

Maybe they are just counting on the time factor, hoping that most victims will be dead by the time the court cases are settled. Maybe they simply can't admit their mistakes. Maybe they fear that recognizing past mistakes will have an impact on future recruitment campaigns.

The war of silence conducted by the leaders of the Canadian Armed Forces and some governmental officials is in some cases just as bad, consequence-wise, as a real war with bombs, deafening noise, injuries and post-traumatic stress effects. It is just different. On the 100th anniversary of Armistice we must also remember the forgotten victims.

Bay of Chaleur area supports province-wide environmental movement

MARIA: – About 250 people gathered on November 10 in Maria for the first demonstration of a province-wide movement, *La planète s'invite au parlement*. Organizers want to pressure governments into having them implement concrete measures to fight climate change by reducing greenhouse gases.

The demonstration was held under less than ideal weather. The wet snow and strong winds didn't seem to discourage the participants. Midway through the march, at Mowat's house, a dozen people made spontaneous speeches. The comments were varied, from criticisms to suggestions and included encouragement and questions.

One of the organizers, Benoit Trépanier, pointed out that the foreseeable future must be used to find solutions to questions often raised by people.

Mr. Trépanier gave the crowd something to think about by providing them with examples of the types of scenarios people should consider: Is flying only twice per year possible, when we have family members in other countries? Is it possible to have only one vehicle per household, in a time when most households have at least two? Bilbo Cyr, a Bay of Chaleur area environmentalist, noted that "it is reassuring to see that many people are ready

to get involved for the environment." He proceeded by asking them where they were when the cement plant opened? Yet he also told them he was happy to see them there.

Mr. Cyr was referring to the Port Daniel cement plant, the biggest industrial producer of greenhouse gases in Quebec.

Hélène Leclère, of Maria, emphasized that "we will have to break our habits of buying useless things. If you feel like buying something, wait a week. It is amazing to see how many things we can avoid buying when we wait a week." Another Maria resident, Monique Audet, insisted that "the Gaspé Peninsula is witnessing first-hand the effects of climate change. The sea is assaulting our territory. It is not when you are dead that it will be time to act."

Hugues Deglaire, a Matane biologist and photographer, put emphasis on the necessity to protect water, given that Quebec and Canada possess respectively 8% and 35% of the world's drinkable water reserves.

"If there is one imminent threat, it is hydraulic fracturing. It is garbage. It represents 575 chemicals (thrown in the soil), including benzene, one of the worst pollutants... Saying this is not being pessimistic, because we must be aware of that," indicated Mr. Deglaire. Carleton's Alexis Deschênes, a former journalist who is now a legal aid lawyer, quoted Gandhi by saying "power is the number (of experts) multiplied by willpower. In the Bay of Chaleur area, we have the number and the willpower... Climate-wise, changing the current reality can be the most beautiful collective project." Mr. Deschênes also made a plea for car-sharing and encouraged people to pick up hitch hikers.

Environnement vert-plus spokesperson Pascal Bergeron begged people to put pressure on elected officials so that low-carbon transition projects can be implemented.

"Transition is too rare at the municipal level, in communities. Individual moves are not enough. It will take citizen committees in transport, in town planning. Transition can be a fantastic construction site," said Mr. Bergeron. Disappointed by the weak participation of municipal councillors and mayors, Cathie Belley, of Maria, encouraged demonstrators to ask questions to their elected people. "Ask them where they were today."

Only one mayor, Carleton's Mathieu Lapointe, raised his hand in the crowd when asked by Pascal Bergeron if there were mayors or councillors among the demonstrators.

La planète s'invite au parlement, or (Planet goes to Parliament), is a movement notably initiated by Dominic Champagne, a Quebec theater director who has been a strong environmental activist over the last decade. Mr. Champagne became world-famous in his field after directing *Cirque du Soleil's* productions, Varekai and Love, the latter being a tribute to the Beatles presented in Las Vegas.

A number of environmental experts are supporting Dominic Champagne's movement. So far, people can sign a petition to convince CAQ's new Quebec government to adopt an ambitious program to slow down climate change. The party presented a rather weak environmental platform during the last campaign.

As SPEC was reaching its deadline, 170,396 people had signed the online petition proposed by The Planet Goes to Parliament. Between 1,000 and 2,000 people sign it every hour.

Marie-Josée Racine, one of the main organizers of the Bay of Chaleur march, points out that "we will hold other activities to keep the movement going."

Former mayor of Chandler Jean Paquin dies at 68

CHANDLER – A former mayor of Chandler, Jean Paquin, died on Saturday, November 3. He was 68 years old. He was mayor of Chandler from 1983 to 1999. The current mayor of the municipality, Louisette Langlois, remembers his strong determination. "He was a man who was outspoken and not afraid of taking a stand for the citizens." She says that he fought for the modernization and sustainability of the Gaspesia paper mill. He was also a force behind the construction of the Chandler marina, she adds. In October 1999, during the last stretch of his fourth term, and upon learning that the mill had been permanently closed by Abitibi-Consolidated, Mr. Paquin suggested the expropriation of the plant by the Town of Chandler but that option was not retained by the ensuing council. He will be missed by his wife, three children, and many relatives and friends.

162 Gaspesians under the Quebec Public Curator

CAPLAN: - All in all, 162 Gaspesians are currently under the protection of the Quebec Public Curator. What is this institution? What is its mission and why should someone file a Protection Mandate. Spec looked into this subject.

Marc-André Gautier, the spokesperson for the Quebec Public Curator recently toured the Gaspé Peninsula to provide seminars about the mission and the role of his organization. Sessions were held in Sainte-des-Monts, Gaspé, Chandler and Caplan. "These sessions are so important. They are free. I'm giving the fourth one, here in Caplan, but over a period of a year we give more than 80 sessions across the province to make sure that people are aware of the importance of making sure who will take care of you once faced with incapacity of taking of yourself. I realize that during the sessions that people aren't aware of the different services available. My role is to explain what is an incapacitated person? What to do when faced with such a problem? What are the options out there? What is the right decision to make and so forth," he added.

In terms of numbers, it is estimated that 160,000 Quebecers are considered unable to take care of themselves (an incapacitated person). On the Gaspé Peninsula, 162 people are under the responsibility of the Quebec Public Curator, 115 are under a private tutorship (curatorship) but under the surveillance of the Curator, four are under a private tutorship without the surveillance of the Curator and 78 Protection Mandates are officially registered. Marc-André Gauthier had this to say, "Concerning theses mandates, one can download the document in our website and name the person that should take care of him or her in case of incapacity. It's not mandatory to do it in front of a lawyer. All you need is to do it before two witnesses."

For further information, one can consult the Curator's website which is translated into English. According to the website "The Public Curator ensures the protection of incapable persons and the patrimony of minors. The Public Curator public also provides support to families and loved ones who are representing an incapable person or who are members of a tutorship council, and supervises the administration of tutorships and curatorships. The Public Curator also acts as the curator or tutor to people who have no loved ones to represent them and act in their best interest. It ensures that decisions are made in the represented person's best interest, and in a manner that respects his/her rights and preserves his/her autonomy."

Stay fit by going to the playground

s do with the swings, the slide... I came early and tried alt new exercises."

GASPÉ: – It may be difficult for parents to find time to exercise, but there's no need to go to the gym. The local playground, with its swings, slides and dome, can also do the job. In her book Plavgrounds for young and old, physical education teacher at Gaspé Cegep, Isabell Provencher, describes 50 ex ercises to do while your chil dren are having fun at the park.

"People who have a family seek moments to exercise," Ms. Provencher says. However, all too often, "we train our children to stay seated: we take them out to the park, then we sit on a bench and watch our cellphone." However, "that's such a good opportunity to move! Not only in playgrounds, but also at the arena, at the pool... Our environment is full of possibilities to exercise."

Since 2014, Ms. Provencher has been providing training to groups, such as hospital employees during lunch hours or new parents with strollers. In this context, the teachers of Gaspé Saint-Rosaire School asked her for a training session in their school yard.

"At first, I trained them in the open space. Then, I thought: there's something to

She had her groups try the exercises and wrote them down. The Sainte-Justine hospital editions, specializing in books about children's health and education, and the well-being of families, saw the interest in her concept for young families.

In Ms. Provencher's book, the 50 exercises are explained in pictures and in words. It's in French but thanks to the pictures, it should be easily understood by anglophones. The author also suggests routines and gives tips, such as warming up by playing tag with our children.

Ms. Provencher knows what she's talking about: she has three children who are aged seven, five and 21 months. "I exercise when I take them to the park and they exercise with me," she says.

VIA Rail and RéGIM to resume shuttle service during Christmas holidays

CARLETON - For the second consecutive year the Régie intermunicipale de transport Îles-de-la-Gaspésie Madeleine (RéGIM), will provide a shuttle service linking the VIA Rail train station in Campbellton to Gaspé during the Christmas holidays.

The two-way bus service will start on December 19 and finish on January 5. The shuttle will make stops in Nouvelle, Richmond, Caplan, New Bonaventure, New Carlisle, Port Daniel, Chandler, Grand River, Cape Cove, Barachois and finally Gaspé.

The stops will be at pre-determined restaurants and convenience stores and the list can be obtained from the RéGIM. The service aims to temporarily replace the VIA Rail train in the Gaspé Peninsula, a service suspended since the end of September 2013.

The decision to have the

shuttle service return is because the pilot project for the 2017-2018 Christmas break was a success, with 204 passengers.

"Last year's results lead us to believe that Gaspesians really need this type of service. We are satisfied with last year's results and we are glad to count on VIA Rail's collaboration again this year. Moreover, those shuttles, synchronized with the train's schedule, allow people to increase their mobility in a collective transport context that totally fits our objectives," says Daniel Côté, president of RéGIM and mayor of Gaspé.

The president of VIA Rail, Yves Desjardins-Siciliano, says he is glad that the 2017 pilot project met the RéGIM's expectations and that of the Ocean train's passengers. The Ocean links Halifax and Montreal through the Matapedia Valley. Gaspesians have used that train since the suspension of the Montreal to Gaspé train.

Mr. Desjardins-Siciliano points out that VIA Rail has signed approximately 20 agreements similar to the RéGIM one across the country in order to increase people's mobility through collective transport.

"Considering the busy Christmas break period, the shuttle service represents an excellent option for Gaspesians," adds Mr. Desjardins-Siciliano.

Train riders will be able to select Gaspesian departure or arrival points such as New Carlisle or Chandler while making reservations on VIA Rail's website or phone service.

The budget required to offer the service last year came from the FARR development fund.

FARR means Fonds d'aide au rayonnement des régions. It supports regional initiatives. A sum of \$34,500 was allotted to the shuttle service.

"This year, we are waiting on an answer from the (Transport) department regarding a program that could fund the project," points out Mariline Lamy-Poirier, communication officer for RéGIM.
