

The Gaspé Peninsula is rich in history. While visiting the many museums, historic sites and interpretation centres you'll certainly come across familiar names such as Jacques Cartier, Charles Robin, Madame Bolduc and Réne Lévesque.

A land rich in heritage

Preserving local history is crucial, and museums and heritage sites play a vital role in housing historical documents and artifacts. They bring history to life in a way that written records alone cannot achieve.

The history of the Gaspé Peninsula predates European arrival, with a significant Indigenous presence. Beyond the well-known evolution of the fishing industry and shipbuilding, the region's history includes events such as the deportation of Acadians, immigration from Scotland, Ireland, and England, and the arrival of people from the Channel Islands in the 18th and 19th centuries.

The Gaspé Peninsula has many offerings for the historical enthusiast, whether interested in learning more about the Devonian period, the region's first settlers, the industries that contributed to the economy, or Nazi spies.

Arts and Music

The region is also home to many artists and musicians. You'll notice many private art galleries and studios advertised along Highway 132. Plan ahead and allow yourself the time to explore a few of the galleries, you won't regret it. Not only will you be amazed by the quality and variety of artistic talent, but spending time with a local artist is an excellent way to learn more about the area.

Wondering what to do in the evening? Many communities offer evenings of live music, such as Wednesday night Jam Sessions in New Richmond and Thirsty Thursdays in Shigawake. You'll also discover that many communities host rather extensive music festivals and agricultural fairs. Museums, historic sites & Interpretation Centres

Battle of the Restigouche National Historic Site (Pointe-à-la-Croix): For 200 years, the wreck of the Machault, a 26-gun military sailing vessel charged with protecting merchant vessels from the British, has remained under water. At the Battle of the Restigouche National Historic Site, it is now possible to admire the ship's remains and to relive the last naval battle between France and Great Britain for possession of North American territory. It's an extraordinary journey that will take you all the way back to 1760! More information

Parc national de Miguasha (Nouvelle): At this protected area, fish and plant fossils tell the story of life, recounting the origin of the first earthly vertebrates, some 380 million years ago. The parc is a natural heritage jewel that's sure to impress visitors of all ages. You will discover a vast array of exhibits and family activities. The park's fossil-rich cliff is on the UNESCO World Heritage list, making Miguasha the best place on earth to discover the fish fossil world of the Devonian period. More information

Cascapedia River Museum (Cascapedia-St-Jules): The Cascapedia River flows through the village of Cascapedia-St-Jules. If it could talk, it would tell a thousand tales about the lives of the people who lived along its banks and about those who came to experience salmon fishing in its waters. It would recount the local folklore about men who lost their lives in log drives or farmers who had to start again after flood waters receded from their fields. For more than 150 years the river has played a very important role in the development and life of this multicultural community. More information


Pointe Duthie (New Richmond): A place for adventure and exploration, you will experience authentic encounters. The eighty-two-acre site has 18 buildings, a former airstrip and pebble beach at the mouth of the Grand-Cascapedia River. Exhibits and displays range from farm machinery and home furnishings to handmade household utensils. More information

Military Museum (New Richmond): The museum's exhibits explore the military history of the region from its earliest times to the present day. The museum is designed to remember the contributions of Gaspesians in the major conflicts of the 20th century and the impact these conflicts have had on the small communities along the shores of the Gaspé Coast. More information



Musée acadien (Bonaventure): The Musée Acadien recounts the fascinating story of the Acadians in Quebec. The museum site includes six buildings, each of which imparts a story related to the region's economic and social development. More information

Kempffer Cultural and Interpretation Centre (New Carlisle): Guided tours of the permanent exhibition, New Carlisle: A Vibrant Heritage, which brings to life the history of the town from the arrival of the Loyalists in 1784 to World War II, including the story of a German spy who was captured in 1942. More information



Museums, historic sites & Interpretation Centres

Espace René-Lévesque (New Carlisle): Composed of a thematic interpretation park and a reception pavilion, the Espace René-Lévesque promotes an approach centered on people, their journey, their thoughts and their actions. An audioguided walk through the garden in the company of René Lévesque at the different stages of his life is available. More information

Paspebiac National Historic Site (Paspebiac): Learn about the cod fishery by visiting the site's historic buildings. The site is the birthplace of the Robin and Le Boutillier Brothers' companies. In the 19th century, Paspebiac was one of the largest export ports for dried cod in the world! The Le Boutillier warehouse, one of the largest fishing buildings ever built in North America, is a five-storey wooden structure. Since 1766, Paspebiac has been at the heart of the history of commercial fisheries in the Gaspé Peninsula, a tradition that is still alive in this area. There is also a fish market, restaurant, canteen, beach and

Maison LeGrand (Port Daniel-Gascons): With its Second Empire architecture, the century-old Maison LeGrand is a jewel among the heritage buildings of Port-Daniel-Gascons. Today, it houses the town hall, the library and a micromuseum presenting the history of the house and the LeGrand family. The grounds include a park with information panels devoted to local history. More information

Circuit des bâtisseurs (Chandler): A historical route that covers the period of the French regime of Bourg de Pabos until the closing of the Gaspésia paper mill. It is an open-air museum crossed by a pedestrian and cycling path. Halfway through, a telescope allows for bird watching. The longest aluminum pedestrian and cycling bridge in the world will allow you to cross the barachois of the Grand Pabos Bay to get to the historical and archaeological site of the Parc du Bourg de Pabos. More information

La Vieille Usine (L'Anse-à-Beaufils): This former cod-fishing plant is located on the wharf. It is now a bistro-style café, venue and art gallery. Enjoy a drink on the terrace as you admire the view of the nearby fishing boats. More information

Le Chafaud – Discovery and Visitors Centre (Percé): Located near the Percé wharf, this large red and white warehouse is one of the most typical buildings of the cod-fishing era. Today, the building houses a discovery centre.

In the 1870s, the Charles Robin Company had nearly 40 buildings in Percé that were used for the cod-fishing trade. Nearby you will discover several of those buildings still standing (La Saline, La Neigère and the General Store). More information

Museums, historic sites & Interpretation Centres

Birthplace of Canada (Gaspé): A reconstruction of the village of Gaspé as it was in the 1900s. Visit the buildings and interact with guides in period costumes. The site includes a heritage house, warehouse, naval base, general store, monuments, a playground and a public market. More information

Manoir Lebouthillier (Gaspé): Here you will learn more about the culture and history of the Gaspé Peninsula. Built around 1850-1860, Manoir Le Boutillier served multiple purposes at the time — fishing station, manager's house, general store and lodging for the hired men. In addition to the interpretation centre there is also a tea room and geocaché activities. More information

Musée de la Gaspesie (Gaspé): Discover the history of the Gaspé Peninsula as you have never seen it before! Travel to the heart of the history of the Gaspé, from 380 million years ago until modern society. Discover various key moments in the history of the peninsula. Take a selfie with a replica of the cross, bearing the


crest of the King of France, that was planted by Jacques Cartier in 1534. More information

Site d'interprétation Micmac de Gespeg: Come live the Mi'kmaq experience in Gaspé! Here you will discover Gespeg's presence in the Gaspé region, its history, and its culture. Visit the realistic recreation of a traditional village circa the 17th century. More information

Le Centre culturel Le Griffon (Gaspé): Visit a former cold-storage warehouse. this cultural centre is an important element of local maritime heritage due to its location near the harbour as well as its history and architecture. On site you will discover exhibitions and a café with an incredible view of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. More information

Forillon National Parc (Forillon): Interpretive activities focused on the the area's natural and historical heritage. The park's heritage sites, include a historic general store, a typical fisherman farmer's house and World War II fortifications. More information



The region's beaches are not the only places to connect with nature, you'll discover the National and provincial parks offer incomparable up-close-to-nature experiences. Although activities differ from park to park, you'll find there's something for everyone.

Parks and nature

Children of all ages absolutely love the **Bioparc** located in **Bonaventure** and situated on the banks of the Bonaventure River estuary where visitors and locals delight in the antics of local fauna such as river otters, seals, raccoons, bears and bobcats. Enquire about feeding times as some of the more timid creatures put on quite a show! The site also boasts a playground, as well as a small petting zoo which is very popular with toddlers. Bring a lunch and have a picnic on site. **More information**

Parc national de la Gaspésie: Created in 1937 in order to permanently protect the park's woodland caribou and the beauty of Mont Albert and the McGerrigle Mountains, as well as the Rivière Sainte-Anne salmon. The park is now recognized as a mecca for hiking. The altitude of the mountains influences the climate. Nature enthusiasts can go hiking, backpacking, trail running, cycling, fishing, canoeing, kayaking and pedal boating at this park. For those seeking a greater adventure, try the whitewater canoeing and kayaking options or a backcountry expedition. Accommodations, dining, a pool and spa are on site. More information

Réserve faunique de Port-Daniel: This park has 25 lakes chockfull of trout and a river with salmon galore. The wildlife diversity is astounding. Activities include fishing, hiking, berry and mushroom picking and moth observations. Chalets and campground available. <u>More information</u>

Parc national de l'Île-Bonaventureet-du-Rocher-Percé (Percé): The park is rich in natural, historical and geological heritage. Sculpted by time and the sea, the park includes Bonaventure Island and Percé Rock. It is famous for its colony of northern gannets. The park has 15 kilometres of hiking trails and several restored houses. Note: Bonaventure Island is only accessible by boat. More information







Forillon National Park: A vaste array of activities are available for nature lovers at Forillon National Park. In the Penouille Peninsula activities include hiking, cycling, paddling, kite surfing, guided discovery activities. If you're travelling with children, be sure to pick up the Xplorers booklet. playground, accessible beach, picnic area and equipment rentals. In the North Area there are camping facilities, boat excursions, a discovery centre, geocaching, as well as hiking and cycling South In the adventure seekers can enjoy a whale watching cruise, scuba wharf fishing kayaking. In this area you can also participate in discovery activities, hike, cycle, go geocaching or visit the pool.

If you take a drive or walk to one of the many wharves along the coast in the summer months, you're likely to encounter locals enjoying one of their favourite pastimes fishing flounder or striped bass. Don't miss out on the opportunity to strike a conversation with them. They might even give some advice on how to reel in a striped bass. All you need is a sturdy rod, heavy line and an artificial lure (license not required). If you succeed is snagging a, it's a thrill you'll be eager to repeat on your next trip to the Gaspé.

Striped bass

Limit 3 per day 50-65 cm inclusively





Angling only with a single hook (max 3 hooks on the line) No natural bait

Flounder

Limit 15 per day



June 24 to July 8, 2024 and from July 17 to August 7, 2024.

Mackerel

Limit 20 per day





Max. 5 lines with a max of 6 hooks each Minimum possession size of 26.8 cm.



- 1. Choose Your Spot: Find a part of the beach where the sand is slightly wet. This kind of sand holds its shape better.
- 2. Gather Your Gear: Bring buckets, shovels, and plastic cups to shape and mold the sand.
- 3. Build a Strong Base: Pack damp sand into a large bucket, compact it well, and then flip the bucket over to create the foundation of your sandcastle.
- 4. Build Towers: Fill smaller buckets or plastic cups with damp sand, pack it tightly, and flip them over to create towers. Place these towers at the corners of your sandcastle base.
- 5. Build Walls: Surround the towers with packed sand to form walls. Use your hands to shape and smooth the sand structure as you go.

6. Create Details: Use small tools like sticks or straws to carve out features such as windows, doors, and battlements in your sandcastle.

sandcastle-building skills.

- 7. Add Decoration: Use seashells, pebbles, or seaweed to embellish your sandcastle for extra flair, being mindful to respect the beach environment.
- 8. Create a Moat: Dig a shallow trench around your sandcastle. Use a small cup to pour water into the moat, creating a protective barrier.
- 9. Consider the Tide: Remember that the tide might wash away your sandcastle, so build closer to the water during low tide to ensure it lasts longer.

Building sandcastles isn't just a fun activity—it's a chance to unleash your creativity surrounded by the natural beauty of the beach.

BEACH

Beach days on the Gaspé Peninsula are simply THE BEST. Locals know which spots are the best for swimming and soaking up the sun, so either ask around or watch the coastline for other beachgoers. Between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. are usually the best times to hang out on the beach. To make the most of your time, you'll want to pack a picnic, and water to stay hydrated. Many Gaspesian beaches do not have changing facilities, so you'll want to arrived dressed for swimming and have a towel or wrap for when your down. Allow yourself some time between swimming/playing in sand before leaving. That way the sand will dry and fall right off.

Local advice

If your day at the beach includes young children, a wagon with large tires can make transporting your gear a breeze, and serves as a great spot for a toddler to nap.

Leave the beach as you found it. Do not leave your litter behind.
