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Lobster season start slowed by erratic weather

SAINT-GODEFROI - The start of the 2025 lobster fishing was somewhat hampered by erratic weather along the south side of the Gaspé Coast. However, some catches made by Bay of Chaleur fishermen were comparable to last year's after three days, a small sampling considering that the season lasts ten weeks.

In Saint-Godefroi, Johnny Ross and George Skene landed approximately the same volumes as in 2024 for the first three days of catches, April 27 to 29. Daily landings hovered around 1,000 pounds, sometimes slightly more, sometimes a bit less, for both fishermen.

"I don't always check my numbers daily but it could be a little better than last year's start," pointed out George Skene, who is delivering his catches to the Saint-Godefroi wharf for the second consecutive year, due to the low water draft at the Shigawake wharf.

In 2024, he considered starting his season in Shigawake, but quickly changed his mind and landed his first catches in Saint-Godefroi. Mr. Skene delivers his catches to Gervais Roussy Inc, in Port Daniel, a subsidiary of Paspebiac's Unipêche MDM.

Johnny Ross indicated that his season start "is probably a bit lower than last year's. It is

Bill Sheehan, vice-president of the Sainte-Thérèse-de-Gaspé processing firm E. Gagnon et Fils, the main buyer of lobster in the Gaspé Peninsula, didn't want to speculate much on May 1 about what the fishermen will receive for their first week of catches.

"I don't know what it will be. Last year, it was \$7.75 per pound for the first week. I don't think we will get there. The catches were not super strong in the Gaspé Peninsula because of the weather, but there is lobster coming from Nova Scotia, where the plants are hit by a 25% tariff imposed by China's government for the lobsters weighing more than two pounds. So, that lobster



be competitive when we sell. Mothers' Day is coming next week though (May 11) and demand will be strong. For now, I can't tell the fishermen what I will pay them if I don't know what I will receive from the supermarkets and fish markets,"

Twenty-five other lobster fishermen based between Bonaventure and Miguasha, as well as on the north side of the Peninsula and around the Forillon peninsula, gradually joined or are joining the fishery since May 3.

Alexis Deschênes defeats Diane Lebouthillier in Gaspésie-Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listuguj

CARLETON - In the April 28 federal election, Alexis Deschênes of the Bloc Québécois won the Gaspésie-les-Îles-dela-Madeleine-Listuguj seat in the House of Commons, defeating incumbent Liberal Member of Parliament Diane Lebouthillier by a margin of 4,274 votes. While this victory margin was clear, the lead shifted several times during the first 75 minutes of ballot counting.

Ms. Lebouthillier was seeking a fourth term since her first victory in 2015. She conducted a grassroots campaign, declining several invitations to debates, notably in Matane and Carleton-sur-Mer.

This was her first election since the abolition of the riding of Avignon-La Mitis-Matane-Matapedia. The Avignon and Matanie MRCs incorporated into Gaspésie-les-Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listuguj, while the Mitis and Matapedia MRCs became part of the new Rimouski-La-Matapédia riding.

In his victory speech, at the Naufrageur microbrewery in Carleton, Alexis Deschênes emphasized from the outset that he and his team were able to counteract the "Carney effect," the phenomenon whereby Canada's new Prime Minister Mark Carney won several ridings for his party be-

cause popular perceptions of him as better equipped to hold his own against United States President Donald Trump.

"We had to transform this fear into a desire for national affirmation, and we did it," Mr. Deschênes told supporters gathered in Carleton, where he lives.

He praised the courage of the electors who voted for him. "They chose a representative who listens and acts, and that's what they'll get," he added.

"My first loyalty will always be to my region and to Quebec. I will be the representative of my riding in Ottawa, not the representative of Ottawa in the riding. We will do everything to take into account the courageous political gesture of the voters of the Gaspésie, Magdalen Islands, and Listuguj," he also exclaimed.

Alexis Deschênes also praised the efforts of his opponents, particularly those of Diane Lebouthillier. "I wish her continued success in the challenges she will face," he emphasized.

The challenge of representing such a vast territory remains significant. Geographically, Gaspésie-les-Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listuguj covers an area slightly larger than Belgium, with the Magdalen Islands to serve, nearly 200 kilometres from the mainland.

Discontent in the Fisheries

Despite Diane Lebouthillier's comments about her time at Fisheries and Oceans Canada, the fact remains that several of her decisions have caused discontent among many fishermen, notably the late announcement re-

garding the resumption of redfish harvesting in 2024, and the low redfish quotas allocated to shrimp fishermen, who were then and still are experiencing a slump due to the collapse of their resource in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

The allocation of a significant number of exploratory lobster licences in the north of the Gaspé Peninsula has also caused some gnashing of teeth, with traditional lobster fishermen fearing that the resource would not be able to support all these new players.

A quick campaign launch and the **VIA Rail issue**

The campaign was dominated by exchanges between the Bloc Québécois candidate and the incumbent MP, exchanges that began even before the official start of the campaign on March 23.

Diane Lebouthillier immediately emphasized the importance of being on the "side of power," alleging that a Bloc Québécois MP would not be able to adequately represent voters because they would not have access to members of the federal cabinet in the event of a Liberal Party victory.

Mr. Deschênes repeatedly retorted that his rival had failed

Defeated, Lebouthillier announces her retirement

CHANDLER – The victory of Bloc Québécois candidate Alexis Deschênes over incumbent Member of Parliament Diane Lebouthillier wasn't nearly as close as a lot of people had expected. Mr. Deschênes was elected with 45.8% of the vote, compared to 38.3% for Ms. Lebouthillier. Conservative Party candidate Jean-Pierre Pigeon managed to secure 12.4%. Although she didn't campaign, New Democrat Denise Giroux received 1.8%, Shawn Grenier of the Rhinoceros Party 1.0%, and People's Party of Canada candidate Christian Rioux garnered a meager 0.8%. Voter turnout reached only 59.59%.

He laments that the Donald Trump effect took up too much space in the election campaign. "The media and the other parties used Trump a lot as a distraction rather than talking about their platforms. They capitalized on the fear of Trump," said Mr. Rioux, who was running for the second time. He isn't ruling out running again.

Losing her ministerial seat didn't work against her. "Not at all, because when you look at the cabinet level, Mr. Carney had decisions to make. With a large riding like we had-because it's a huge territorythere are all the issues: agriculture, forestry, fisheries, industry, trade, six airports, a mountain range, two time zones. We have Canada in one riding. The challenges are immense," she said.

For Diane Lebouthillier, this defeat marks the end of her political career. "I'm going back to my property, where I can enjoy myself and stop travelling. Sur-

GASPÉ - A Liberal advertisement promoting the party's team in Quebec City and the eastern part of the province forgot to include Diane Lebouthillier.

The full-page ad, published on April 26 in the Journal de Québec - two days before the election - mentions the names of the candidates, including Alexander Reford in Rimouski-La Matapédia and Rémi Massé in Côte-du-Sud-Rivière-du-Loup-Kataskomiq-Témiscouata. However, it failed to mention the name of Diane Leboutihillier, the outgoing Liberal Member of the



The ad was bought by the official agent for Jean-Yves Duclos in Quebec City. When contacted for comment, Ms. Lebouthillier's campaign team said they had contacted Mr. Duclos's team, who acknowledged the omission and called it a mistake.

Her Bloc Québécois opponent, Alexis Deschênes, reacted on the social media platform X writing: "What to make of this Liberal ad naming all the candidates in eastern Quebec except Diane Lebouthillier in Gaspésie-Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listugui?" He did not elaborate further.

The Table of Prefects and mayor of Gaspé react to federal election

GASPÉ - The Gaspé Peninsula Table of Prefets was expecting a tighter electoral race in the region. Nonetheless the results are unequivocal and reflect the population's interest in the campaign, which led the Bloc Québécois' Alexis Deschênes to win the election in the riding of Gaspésie-Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listuguj.

Following his election, the new Member of Parliament (MP) listed the return of the passenger train to Gaspé, and possible new tariffs in the forestry industry as among his top priorities.

"The return of the train is a major issue for us. In the forestry industry, we agree that in the short term with the current crisis with the United States, there is a lot of uncertainty. Yes, these priorities are consistent with those of the

Table des préfets. As for housing, we're going to sit down together and work on solutions to get the Government of Canada more involved in adding rental housing,' says Mathieu Lapointe, President of the Table of Prefects.

The fact that the riding is now represented by an opposition MP after 10 years of Liberal representation is not a concern according to Mr. Lapointe. "For us, the important thing is to have an MP who is present on the ground and who listens. I have no doubts about that. We're also in a minority government situation, and the Bloc will be able to play an influential role," Mr. Lapointe added confidently.

The vastness of the territory remains a challenge, regardless of the MP. "But with today's technologies, we can meet virtually and rally around common issues," believes Mr. Lapointe.

Although he was long rumoured to be the Bloc candidate in the election that ended on April 28, Gaspé mayor Daniel Côté says he has no regrets, even after the Bloc Québécois won by a large majority in Gaspésie-Les Iles-dela-Madeleine-Listuguj.

"I have no regrets. Three parties approached me. With the vastness of the territory and the distance between federal issues and the population, I'm not sure that's what motivates me in life and that's what motivated my decision," explains Mr Côté, whose wife is expecting a child very soon.

"I'm a hands-on guy. I find municipal politics more appealing than federal politics," explains the mayor, who was defeated in 2011 by New Democrat candidate Philip Toone, the representative for Gaspésie-Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine during the Orange Wave.

Sûreté du Québec seeks public assistance in Pointe-à-la-Croix shooting

A septuagenarian was wounded by a small-caliber weapon on the evening of April 28, at approximately 10:30 p.m. in his home in Pointe-à-la-Croix . He was treated for minor injuries at the Campbellton hospital shortly after. A man in his sixties was arrested the following day and charged with 11 counts on April 30 at the New Carlisle courthouse. However, the criminal prosecutor withdrew the charges against the suspect shortly after because that prosecutor no longer had any evidence against a 60-year-old man from Listuguj. The incident may have been drugrelated.

"The Sûreté du Québec is asking the public for information on this case. It occurred on Chaleur Street, in an apartment building. We can also say that it is not related to the battle between criminal groups in the Gaspé Peninsula," explains Sûreté du Québec communication officer Frédéric Deshaiens, referencing recent assaults on small-time dealers by individuals from outside the region over control of drug sales.

Mathieu Élément sentenced to 48 months for drug dealing

Mathieu Élément, 42, a repeat drug trafficking offender from the Saint-Mauricede-l'Échouerie sector of Gaspé, was recently sentenced to 48 months in prison after a major drug seizure that took place a month ago. On April 9, police conducted two searches of Mathieu Elément's vehicle and residence, police discovered, among other things, nearly 1.2 kilograms of cocaine, more than 2,000 methamphetamine pills, Cialis, Viagra, magic mushrooms, and more than \$10,000 seven to eight years without a prompt guilty plea, given the large quantity of drugs seized. Judge Paradis warned Mr. Élément that any future convictions for similar offences could result in sentences between 12 and 15 years

hicle later. The occupants were transported to a hospital for treatment of minor injuries," says Sûreté du Québec spokesperson Frédéric Deshaies. Investigators from the Rimouski Major Crimes Investigation Division and a forensic identification technician attended the scene to clarify the circumstances of the incident. Anyone who has information relating to this event can contact the criminal information Centre of the Sûreté du Québec at 1-800 659-4264, confidentially.

Patrick Prince's bail hearing postponed

The initial bail hearing for Patrick Prince, 41, who faces 15 charges related to fraud involving false representation of a financial institution in the Côte-de-Gaspé region, was postponed until May 2, just after SPEC's deadline. The man from Port-Daniel-Gascons, who is well known to police forces, has reportedly only had one victim so far, but the criminal prosecutor has confirmed that additional charges will be filed against the suspect. The defence is in discussions with the Public Prosecutor's Office, and the case could well be resolved with a guilty plea soon. Patrick Prince was arrested on April 23 near a financial institution on Renard Boulevard East in Rivière-au-Renard. Police officers recovered over \$3,000, bank cards, and equipment that may have been used to commit fraud. The Sûreté du Québec is continuing its investigation.

Diane Chrétien pleads guilty to major fraud

Diane Chrétien, 62, from Gaspé, pleaded guilty to major fraud at the Alban Aspirault grocery store in Rivière-au-Renard. According to CHNC, a pre-sentence report has been requested, with sentencing submissions scheduled for September 23 in Percé. The woman worked for the family business from 2011 to 2022 and was appointed cashier manager in cash. Judge Denis Paradis agreed with the joint suggestion of the defence and in 2015. Between January 2016 to June 2022, she admitted to stealing \$700 per week the criminal prosecutor, reminding Elément that the sentence could have been from the grocery store, for an estimated \$200,000. It was after a customer complained about the woman in 2021 that the company installed cameras. The crimes involved cancelling cash register transactions on the cash register and then charging the exact amount to the bank card. Chrétien also admitted to taking \$1,640 from an employee fund under her care. Ms. Chrétien has since repaid the amount.

Two injured in a moose collision in Gaspé

A collision between a car and a moose injured two individuals on the evening of April 30 in Gaspé. "The accident occurred around 6:50 p.m. on Route 197 in the Saint-Majorique sector. The vehicle swerved after hitting the animal and ended in the ditch, a few metres lower than the road. The driver and a three-year-old child were taken to Gaspé Hospital with minor injuries," says Frédéric Deshaies, of the Sûreté du Québec. Traffic was delayed while the vehicle was towed.

Cap-Chat residents injured in late-night home invasion

On April 25, around 8:30 p.m., emergency services were called to a residence on Notre Dame Street west in Cap-Chat following reports of an altercation. The investigation suggests that hooded suspects entered the residence, leading to a confrontation with the occupants. One victim managed to activate an alarm, prompting the suspects to flee with certain items. "The suspects" are described as white and they left on foot in an unknown direction. They could have taken a ve-

Sébastien Bujold to address employment insurance fraud charges

Sébastien Bujold, 41, from Carleton, is expected to settle his employment insurance misrepresentation cases on June 10. The man faces 98 counts of making false or misleading statements about his bi-weekly benefits between June 15, 2019 and February 2024, for unreported income. Fines for such offences range from \$200 to \$5,000 per guilty verdict. The criminal prosecutor confirms that both parties will submit a joint submission to Judge Janick Poirier on June 10.

Charges dropped against Marcel and Benoît English

The charges that were pending against Marcel English, 61, and his brother, Benoît, 59, both from Gaspé, have been withdrawn by the criminal prosecutor. They had faced multiple charges, including arson, death threats, and mischief, following a dispute on a hunting ground. The prosecutor decided to drop the charges due to insufficient evidence to prove the allegations beyond a reasonable doubt.

Canada is divided

Some elections offer an occasion to mark history. If there is one lesson to be learnt from the April 28 election, it is that Canada is politically more divided than at any time since at least 1993, when the Bloc Québécois harvested 50 ridings shocking people from Halifax to Vancouver.

However, in 1993, there was a huge consensus elsewhere in Canada, about the Liberal Party's ability to run the country. The division was essentially visible between Quebec and the rest of Canada.

This time around, it is different. Canada is back in two-party mode, if we consider that the seven seats won by the New Democratic Party and the 24 seats saved by the Bloc Québecois are almost drops in a bucket of 343 constituencies. Moreover, 85% of expressed votes went to the Liberal Party and the Conservative Party, something that had not been seen in more than half-a-century.

The contrast in style between Liberal Party leader Mark Carney and Conservative Party leader Pierre Poilièvre couldn't be more evident. The banker's quiet, measured and at times boring way of presenting speeches is pitted against the pugnacious, loud, angry and mostly frustrated rant of Mr. Poilièvre.

Although some analysts observed during the campaign similarities between the two men's programs, considering that Mark Carney frequently mentioned that he is open to build more pipelines, the platforms and the way to reach their goals could hardly be more different.

Mark Carney suggested pipelines but he also expressed a clear openness for renewable energies and a transition towards green electricity. Pierre Poilièvre favoured the "Drill, baby, drill!" slogan of Donald Trump with little mention of renewable sources of energy.

Mark Carney insisted on the necessity of strengthening the funding of CBC during the campaign, while Pierre Poilièvre has insisted since winning the Conservative Party leadership race in September 2022 on defunding the public broadcaster, again the way Donald Trump is axing public services in the United States.

The Liberal Party surely took a few steps to the right of the political spectrum with the arrival of Mark Carney at its helm, but chances are that he will opt for consensual positions in some stakes that could trigger controversies. Although Canada is rich in hydrocarbons, there is hardly any promoter ready to launch a pipeline project in a context that has recently favoured a decrease in oil prices, thanks to the recession Donald Trump's silly tariffs are creating. Moreover,

provinces have a big say in the adoption of pipelines because drinkable water is a provincial jurisdiction.

In Quebec for example, a rejuvenation of the Energy East project would mean crossing the Saint Lawrence river at some point. However, at least 50% of Quebecers take their drinkable water from that river's watershed. Quebecers won't risk polluting their water, which must come before oil.

How to lose a 25% lead

In January, Pierre Poilièvre's party was 25% ahead of the liberals according to some surveys. However, events like Donald Trump's inauguration on January 20 and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's announcement of his resignation on January 6, combined with Mark Carney's entry into the Liberal leadership race, changed the political dynamics.

Despite these changes, Pierre Poilièvre stuck to his rigid style and slogans. He kept talking about axing the carbon tax even after Mark Carney's March 9 leadership victory. It also took him weeks before openly criticizing Donald Trump's ambition to turn Canada into the United States' 51st state.

In all likelihood, Mr. Poilièvre didn't want to hurt the part of his hardcore base that would gladly opt for the integration of Canada to our neighbours of the south.

Although the Conservative Party increased its voting percentage compared to the last polls, reaching 41.3%, the uneven distribution of those votes, illustrated by many landslides in Alberta and Saskatchewan constituencies and insufficient support in too many ridings in other provinces, led to a relatively clear defeat.

The increased voting percentage garnered by the Conservative Party, the highest since the creation of the party in 2003 out of a joint venture made of the Reform Party, the remains of the Progressive Conservative Party and the Canadian Alliance, also came from the weaknesses of Maxime Bernier's People's Party. The latter lost 4.2% between the 2021 poll and this year's. It also might explain why Pierre Poilièvre insisted so much on law and order policies, as well as populist orientations like forbidding the ban on plastic bags' single use.

Pierre Poilièvre even lost his seat in Carleton, an area located in Ottawa. His opponent, Bruce Fanjoy, of the Liberal Party, received an absolute majority, collecting 51% of the votes.

Mr. Poilièvre has already been able to convince a Conservative Member of Parliament in Alberta to "give" him his seat. However, it will require a by-election. Although the prime minister could legally take up to six months before calling that byelection, and despite the Conservative Party leader's caveman manners at the House of Commons, Mark Carney has assured Mr. Poilièvre that he will facilitate his return to parliament!

In the meantime, in the Gaspé Peninsula...

In the riding of Gaspésie-Îles-de-la-Madeleine-Listuguj, Bloc Québécois candidate Alexis Deschênes won with a clear margin of 4,277 ballots against Diane Lebouthillier. He was heavily supported by Parti Québécois' Matapedia-Matane Member of the National Assembly Pascal Bérubé and his organization. It undoubtedly made a difference in that new part of the riding.

Mr. Deschênes conducted an energetic campaign. He is eloquent in public, taking clear and well-reflected stands, which is a tremendous asset when dealing with electors who haven't made up their mind on who to vote for. There were many of them during that campaign, wondering if they had to strategically support the Liberal Party because of Mark Carney's way of dealing with Donald Trump, or sticking to their convictions.

Diane Lebouthillier was at the same time heavily handicapped by a regional record that was less than outstanding, which is an understatement, especially in commercial fisheries, despite her tenure as Minister of Fisheries and Oceans Canada for a tad over 19 months.

During that period, she minimally failed to recognize the magnitude of the shrimp crisis, and to think of solutions that could allow mackerel and herring fishermen to deal with moratoriums hitting their species.

In addition to such stands, she completely missed on the importance of improving inter-regional transport. Air fares are still exorbitant and VIA Rail's services are still suspended.

She put emphasis on the importance of being on the side of power even before the real start of the electoral campaign. However, after nine-and-a-half years as a cabinet member of the government, she was unable to improve the Gaspesians and Magdalen Islands' access to fair and affordable transportation means. That failure was costly for her on April 28.





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Bruno-Pierre Godbout is remanded in custody

PERCÉ - Chandler town councillor Bruno-Pierre Godbout will remain in jail for the duration of legal proceedings. That was the verdict of Quebec Court Judge Denis Paradis during the bail hearing held on April 25 at the Percé Courthouse.

The defence and the Crown presented their arguments in the morning during a hearing that lasted two-and-a-half hours. The defence requested that Godbout be released since he did not pose a danger to the victims or the public, and since he would be subject to numerous conditions if granted bail.

Bruno-Pierre Godbout testified, guaranteeing a \$2,500

deposit and an equivalent amount without a deposit. A relative of the accused also promised a \$2,500 deposit for his release.

For its part, the criminal prosecution argued that the charges are very serious, including the aspect of violence and control toward the victims. It called a Sûreté du Québec investigator who indicated that the investigation is still ongoing. At the time of his arrest on April 15, police indicated that there may be additional victims.

After taking the decision under advisement, the judge ruled at the end of the day on the side of the criminal prosecution, considering that the acrelease cused's would undermine public confidence in the justice system, that he faces a sentence of between five and ten years in prison, and that the evidence presented during the bail hearing appeared credible.

The 36-year-old man faces 12 charges related to sexual assault, assault with a weapon, assault, unlawful confinement, and criminal harassment following an arrest warrant.

The events allegedly occurred between 2010 and 2025 in Bonaventure, Gaspé, Newport, Saint-Nérée-de-Bellechasse, and Montreal. A publication ban was issued to protect the identities of the victims.

At the time of his arrest, the Sûreté du Québec stated that Mr. Godbout allegedly used his notoriety to contact the vic-

tims.

In addition to being a municipal councilor, Mr. Godbout works as a physical rehabilitation therapist at the Gaspé Peninsula Integrated Health and Social Services Centre (CISSS).

Being remanded in custody represents a new setback for the individual, who is already facing charges of fraud, forgery, and using, possessing, or trafficking in a document. These charges were filed following an investigation by the Permanent Anti-Corruption Unit (UPAC) while the councillor was pro-mayor of Chandler following the suspension of former mayor Louisette Langlois in 2021.

UPAC estimated the amount of fraud at approxi-

mately \$10,000. In addition, a case dating back to 2021 related to an illegal sports betting lottery remains under review by the Crown.

CHANDLER: Councillor Bruno-Pierre Godbout called to resign

CHANDLER - The mayor of Chandler is calling for the resignation of Newport ward councillor Bruno-Pierre Godbout, who is facing charges related to violent crimes.

The town council also tabled a notice of motion on April 24 to terminate his remuneration.

Mayor Gilles Daraîche says he learned of the allegations against Mr. Godbout at the same time as the public, on April 15.

"We all agreed that we had to act and not let this drag on. In the minutes that followed, we spoke to our lawyers," says the mayor, trying to find out how to proceed.

"There are rules to follow. Some people are saying on social networks that the town

"To ensure that in order to be paid, you have to be seated at the council table for the monthly meeting. This is very important. We're going to stop paying people who aren't there," says the mayor. Currently, councillors earn \$2,171 per month. "That's the only way we can avoid paying people who are absent," explains Mr. Daraîche, even though the by-law makes no exception for justified absences. "We don't have much room to manoeuvre. People have to understand. Asking for the resignation and amending the law on the remuneration of elected representatives are the only things that can be done. These are important actions," maintains the mayor.

may push its adoption past the next council meeting on May 5.

Regarding legal fees stemming from a separate 2021 travel expense lawsuit, when Mr Godbout was pro-mayor, the bill amounts to \$9,500, according to the mayor.

Mr Godbout had been absent from council since April 2024, following a voluntary withdrawal under an agreement reached with the Municipal Commission. That agreement allowed him to continue receiving his salary while awaiting further developments.

Another agreement, between Mr. Godbout and the Town of Chandler stipulates that the town will be reimbursed for legal fees if he is acquitted of the charges.

Mr. Godbout is facing charges of fraud, forgery and use, possession or trafficking of a document. UPAC has estimated the fraud at around \$10,000. Reimbursement of legal costs is guaranteed.

"At the Town of Chandler, there is a severance bonus. There are signed agreements," points out the mayor. Even if Councillor Godbout no longer had any assets, the severance package would allow the Town to pay itself back.

"At least for the legal fees. As for the salary, we'll check with Municipal Affairs, because they're the ones who came to an agreement. He did not sit on the council, but was recognised as a councillor of the Town of Chandler because he was temporarily withdrawn. We're in touch with the Municipal Commission. If he had been completely withdrawn, we wouldn't have had to pay his salary, but as he is temporarily withdrawn, we're going to check with Municipal Affairs,"says Mr Daraîche.

The mayor also clarified that any legal fees related to Mr. Godbout's arrest on April 15 are not being paid by the town, as the alleged victims are not elected officials.

As SPEC went to press on May 2, Bruno-Pierre Godbout had not submitted his resignation.

QUEBEC CITY - The Coalition Avenir Québec (CAQ) Members of the National Assembly representing the Gaspésie may not be deemed qualified enough to serve as regional ministers, at least that is the impression left by Christopher Skeete, Minister responsible for Regional Development, during a budget session on April 29.

The comment came in response to a question from Parti Québécois Member of the National Assembly (MNA) for Matane-Matapédia Pascal Bérubé, during the study of the 2025-2026 budget in the parliamentary committee.

"I want to talk about the

Abitibi-Témiscamingue and Gaspésie-Îles-de-la-Madeleine regions. Does the minister think it would be a good idea for these two regions to have regional ministers who are MNAs for that territory?" asked Pascal Bérubé.

"I think it's on a case-bycase basis," replied Mr. Skeete. "Does he think it would be desirable?" asked Mr. Bérubé again.

"I don't make the connection between the idea and the conclusion as to whether or not it's a good thing. You can have a minister responsible for your region who is from your region and that doesn't mean that he or she would be good," said Mr. Skeete.

Questioned on the sidelines of a press conference, the

mayor of Gaspé preferred to be cautious in his comments.

"That's the Premier's prerogative. I still think it's unfortunate that we don't have a regional minister among our regional deputies, but I can't say that we're badly served by Minister Maïté Blanchette Vézina, who is doing the necessary representational work as regional minister. But it has always been an advantage to have a regional minister among our deputies. I won't say any more," says Daniel Côté.

He points out that in the past, ministers representing the region have been in Quebec City and Montreal.

Currently the Regional minister is the MNA for Rimouski.

BONAVENTURE - The Baiedes-Chaleurs Chamber of Commerce and Industry (CCIBDC) expects the Member of Parliaments elected on April 28 in a minority government in Ottawa to work constructively together to advance priority issues for the Canadian economy. The threat of additional tariffs from the United States still looms over Canada.

"First and foremost, with a minority government, it's about working together with a common goal to counter these tariffs and work towards economic development," said CCIBDC Director Valentine Palma in a joint release with the Fédération des chambres de commerce du Québec. "As a first step, it would be important to have trade diplomacy with a chief negotiator to work hand in hand with our American neighbours. That would already be very important. Within Canada, we need to break down barriers and promote trade between provinces, and finally we need to promote a Canadian procurement policy and encourage local content in public

but it's true that having people who are already aware of the whole climate and who have had initial meetings with the Trump administration should help a great deal," she noted.

Business leaders are struggling with the lack of predictability from the US government, particularly with a president who frequently shifts positions on tariffs.

"Having a chief negotiator for Canada with a Canadian negotiating team coordinating with this administration might help us know where we stand. To have a guarantee on future tariffs or how we could come to an agreement. It would be important to have a fairly solid team," she concluded.

What Mom wants for Mother's Day isn't expensive and it isn't a hard-to-find item. What she's really hoping for is the gift of time, with the people she loves most.



Haute-Gaspésie saw the strongest growth, with a 30% increase, reaching 20,864 trips. The Bay of Chaleur saw a 5% increase, reaching CASA Another gain, this time in the paratransit managed by RéGIM: 17,995 trips were made in the Bay of Chaleur area, 862 more than in 2023. The same is true in Haute-Gaspésie, with an increase of 470 for a total of 10,906. COMMUNITY

Special trips organized for festivals or to ski resorts saw the number of passengers increase by 33% for a total of 18,037 trips. Bike-sharing is also growing, with 14,325 kilometres travelled, almost double the 7,440 kilometres travelled in 2023. The Carletonsur-Mer resort is the most popular, with 7,799 kilometres and a growth of 289%. New Richmond followed with 2,295 kilometres travelled, a growth of 143%.

"The numbers are constantly evolving. If we look at public transit ridership, we're talking about a 9% increase. A few years ago, we thought it would be nice to reach 100,000 passengers on our buses annually. We're at 93,044 passengers, a record," says Gaspé Mayor and RéGÎM President, Daniel Côté.

"We see a positive future. If we had more resources, we would arrive with a more developed network, with new transportation options," notes the president, who dreams of a time when buses could run every two hours instead of just mornings, lunchtime and evenings. "We have a sustainable mobility plan for Gaspésie-Les Îles-dela-Madeleine. We want it to become a reality, and that means investing in our infrastructure and services. We often don't have the means to make these investments ourselves, and that requires government assistance," says Mr. Côté. The RéGÎM is financed by a one-cent tax on every litre of gasoline sold in the Gaspé Peninsula and Magdalen Islands, municipal contributions, and user contributions.

Since the electrification of transportation reduces revenue from the gas tax, the RéGÎM is continuing its discussions to request the imposition of a vehicle registration tax, but nothing is simple.

"There are many administrative and legal issues surrounding the admission of an intermunicipal authority to a registration tax," says the president.

The current law permits MRCs to impose tax registrations, not the boards. "It's a major administrative headache to see if there's a possibility, and if it is possible, perhaps we could levy a small registration tax to make up for the losses in the gas tax," suggests the president.






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
